Summer Bible School Opens At Summerside

The second annual Summer Bible School at Summerside commenced recently in the Presbyterian Church hall. With an attendance of 84 the school has approximately 15 more pupils than last year. The increasing popularity of the school is shown by the fact that 22 new scholars have enrolled for the first time this year.

The staff consists of Miss Dolly Matthews, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Duncanson, from Alberton, Mr. Lloyd Henderson, from Canoe Cove, Rev. Mr. William Rhoad, B. B. and Rev. Mr. William Verwool, B. A. Mr. Duncanson and Mr. Henderson are both employed as student ministers in congregations for the summer.

With the school opens that children attend from every Protestant church in town, and seven scholars are brought in from Kensington. There are grades for every one from Kindergarten to twelve, and any adult is welcome to sit in with the upper grade scholars. Mr. Verwool states that next year, as the school develops, a Teacher's Training course will be added to the above. In every way it is a real school. Scholars are expected to concentrate on subject matter in relation to the Bible for about 12 hours a week, but only a minimum of home work, if any, is expected. A demonstration will be given on Sunday morning the 23rd in the Presbyterian Church.

Princetown Bible, Missionary Society Observe Centenary

The Keir Memorial Presbyterian Church at Malpeque was filled to capacity on Tuesday for the centenary of the organization of the Princetown Bible and Missionary Society. The Presbytery was also held in conjunction with the other meetings, and all meetings were held under the auspices of the Presbytery of P. E. Rev. Hensley Staver, M.A., Moderator of Presbytery was chairman of all meetings. The Presbytery met at 10 A.M., 1.30 and again at 4.30 P.M.

The evening meeting was at 8 P.M. The meetings opened with a call to worship and invocation; Scripture readings and prayer.

Mr. John Carson, student minister at Malpeque, gave a very interesting paper on the life of Dr. John Keir, who organized the Society at Princetown.

A reading from a lecture by Rev. Dr. J. Keir Fraser, "Present comparative statistics of the British and Foreign Bible Society from 1839 to 1939" was given by Rev. W. O. Rhoad, and were most interesting.

A very excellent address by Rev. Dr. J. Keir Fraser on "reasons why we should read and study the Bible" was the high light of the afternoon. Rev. Fraser stressed the literary and moral value from Bible reading; the revelation of God and Christ and the salvation of the world; and also the teaching of constitutional government and the manner of man's living and his duty to his fellow.

Evening Service

Missions was the theme of the evening service, with an opening period of devotion. Rev. G. O. Webster, spoke on "Great Prospects for Home Missions."

Rev. W. L. Dettlor spoke on present prospects of foreign missions and Mrs. H. O. T. Burkwall gave an address on Missionary work in China and emphasized the loyalty of the Chinese to Christianity during the present war. A program of music was part of the evening service. Mrs. Wm. Verwool sang "A Little Talk With Jesus"; Miss MacDonald accompanied. Miss MacDonald and George Howass sang in duet the "Crown of Thorns." The meetings were all helpful and encouraging and marked another milestone in the history of the Princetown Society.
