FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT

Grand Torchlight Procession and Fireworks Display.

Successful Sports at the Park Yesterday.

The Island Teams Break the Records,

And Capture the Lion's Share of Prize Money.

The Promenade Concert and Band Competition.

The firemen's tournament was brought to a close with the sports at the park yesterday, and a promenade concert and band competition in the exhibition building last evening.

The torchlight procession and display of fireworks on Thursday evening, which concluded the first day's proceedings, were very pleasing features.

The sports began about eleven o'clock. The first event was the half-mile horse race (10 men), 1st prize \$250; 2nd, \$100.

The conditions of this race were as follows: Reel to carry 300 feet of cotton hose. Run to hydrant, connect, lay 250 feet hose, break coupling, put on pipe, time to be taken when pipe strikes the ground.

The Charlotte town team was made up as follows: D. J. Macdonald, Captain; William Edmonds, L. Macdonald, L. Wheeler, J. F. Wheeler, Nick Rundle, James Rundle, Victor D. user, H. Large and John McLeod.

of St. Stephen, with E. Herrit, Truro, second and E. Power, Halifax, third. Time—10:15.

Hook and Ladder Race, with apparatus (10 men)—1st prize, \$100; 2nd, \$50. There were only two entries for this event—Halifax and Charlottetown. The Halifax team won.

Conditions—Run 300 yards with apparatus, remove ladder from truck, raise and mount, time to be taken when man grasps top rung.

Flat race, open to Salvage Corps only, distance 100 yards—1st prize, \$12; 2d, \$8; 3d, \$5. 1st, D. J. Macdonald, Ch'town; 2d, William Edmonds, do; 3rd, Victor Douce, do. Time, 10 1/2.

Quarter mile flat race, open to all firemen—1st prize, \$15; 2d, \$10; 3rd, \$5. 1st William Edmonds, Charlottetown; 2d, E. Herrit, Truro; 3rd, D. J. Macdonald, Ch'town. Time, 54 1/2.

Flat race for Hook and Ladder men only, distance 100 yards—1st prize, \$12; 2d, \$8; 3d, \$5. 1st, Daniel Finlayson, Ch'town; 2d, T. Downing, Halifax; 3rd, H. Hooper, Ch'town. Time, 11 sec.

Three hundred yards Hose Reel race (10 men)—1st prize, \$100; 2d, \$50. Conditions same as in half-mile race. This race was contested by teams representing Moncton, Amherst, Antigonish, Charlottetown, Truro, St. Stephen and Halifax. They run in the order in which their names appear.

The Moncton team made a good run to the hydrant, but before the hose could be attached thereto it was snatched out of the hoseman's hands, and the race was abandoned.

A mishap almost similar in its character occurred to the Antigonish team, and they, too, gave up the contest. The Amherst men made a very good run, but lost on the breaking and coupling.

Truro also made a good run, but as they started off at the snap of the starter's pistol instead of waiting until it was discharged, no official time was taken.

The team was offered the privilege of running the race over again, and agreed to do so, but subsequently declined, saying they were too tired.

The Charlottetown team made an excellent run, doing everything up in good time and style; but the St. Stephen team, which run next, made better time. The Halifax team run last, doing very good work.

Prowse Bros., "the Wonderful Cheap Men," very kindly offered a special prize of \$200 to be competed for by the Moncton and Antigonish teams that met with the mishap at the hydrant.

The Antigonish men were all ready for the competition, but the Moncton captain said he could not get his men together, as some of them had gone to town. Therefore there was no race.

The announcement was subsequently made that Mr. Prowse would divide the money between the two teams.

Half-mile flat race, open to all firemen—1st prize, \$20; 2d, \$15; 3rd, \$10. 1st—E. Power, Truro; 2d, E. Herrit, 3rd, R. P. Grant, Ch'town. Time, 2:08 1/2.

Consolation race, distance quarter mile, open to all who took no place in any of the events—1st, D. S. Chisholm, Antigonish; 2d, L. M. Donald, Ch'town; 3rd, D. M. Macdonald, do. Time, 55 1/2 sec.

R. B. Norton & Co., "the extraordinary cheap hardware men," very thoughtfully increased the prize money in this event by \$25—doubling each of the three prizes.

Tug of War, (10 men)—1st prize, \$50; 2d, \$25. Competed for by teams representing Antigonish and Charlottetown. Won by Charlottetown team.

This event concluded the programme, and the large assemblage dispersed. The day's proceedings closed with a grand promenade concert and band competition in the Exhibition Building, which began at 8 o'clock.

There was a large attendance, and the excellent music discoursed by the two bands competing for the prizes, viz., the Artillery Band of St. John, N. B., and the Citizens Band, Charlottetown, B., and the leadership of that veteran bandmaster, Mr. Galbraith.

The first prize of \$50 was awarded the St. John band and the second prize of \$30 was awarded the Citizens Band. It is but fair to state that the St. John band had superior instruments and about twice as many players.

The judges were Professor Caven, C. P. Fletcher and S. Blanchard. At the close of the concert hearty cheers were given for the visiting and local bands, the visiting firemen and the home department and for Mayor Chipman, of St. Stephen, N. B. Mayor Chipman acknowledged the cheers in a neat speech, in the course of which he expressed his pleasure at the kind manner in which he and the other visitors had been entertained since their arrival in Charlottetown, and his great satisfaction at the fairness shown the different competitors in the sports during the day. He also warmly congratulated the firemen composing the home teams upon their success, and the tournament committee upon the splendid way in which they had carried out the elaborate programme prepared for their celebration.

Mayor Chipman, of St. Stephen, N. B., was very active and energetic in helping to make the tournament a success. He was here, there and everywhere at the sports yesterday, never seeming to tire.

The records were badly smashed yesterday by the local Hose, Salvage Corps and Hook and Ladder teams. The applause that greeted "the boys" while they were at work and when they had successfully performed their respective tasks was deafening. The visiting teams were also liberally treated in this respect.

The different flat races were well con-

tested. The Island boys more than held their own. When Edmonds, of Charlottetown, captured first place in the quarter mile, defeating a field of seventeen which included Herrit, Nova Scotia's crack "sprinter," there was a tremendous shout, and "Billy" was given a "bouree" in grand style. The three McDonalds, Dan, Finlayson, and the other Islanders whose names appear amongst the prize-winners, were also loudly applauded.

The Charlottetown firemen made a "big scoop" at the sports yesterday. Of the \$1,040 distributed, they captured about \$700. The prizes were paid over at central station last evening.

The Halifax hose team was greatly handicapped by the loss of one of their best men, Lieut. Miller, who was summoned home by telegraph on account of the sudden death of his father. The team would no doubt have done much better work had Mr. Miller been able to remain with them.

The St. Stephen hose team had an advertisement of "Surprise Soap" printed across the breasts of their jerseys. But there wasn't anything "soapy" about the "surprise" tendered them by the Charlottetown team in the half-mile race!

Messrs. Prowse Bros. and R. D. Norton & Co. deserve credit for their very great kindness in supplementing the tournament prize list as they did yesterday. Their kind offers were duly appreciated by the competitors, and each announcement was received with applause by the spectators.

On Thursday evening the captains of the different companies in attendance at the tournament were treated to a drive out to the waterworks and were subsequently shown to what height water could be thrown from the hydrants.

The Salvage Corps and Hook and Ladder men appeared out in their new uniforms for the first time at the tournament. They looked well.

The St. John and Citizens' Band rendered good music at the sports yesterday. The former played for a short time on Queen Square the previous evening. Their mascot was a great swell.

The visiting firemen were all fine able-looking men, and conducted themselves very well during their stay.

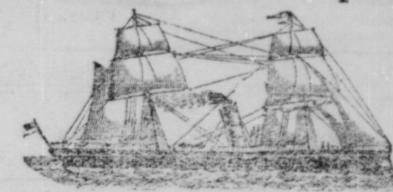
