BUTTER AND CHEESE.—Montreal advises report that the cheese market continues quiet with little demand from shippers, who are not quite prepared to advance on \$2c. for finest, while sellers want more, as a great deal of the goods coming forward cost fully that. We quote the finest Western \$1c. to \$2c., and Quebec makes \$c. Butter is quiet and demand is rather slack, with buyers disposed to demand concessions when it is a case of business for export. We quote 18 1/2c.

INCREASED MILITIA ESTABLISHMENTS.—From the Militia Establishment List, to hand to-day, we learn that the Charlottetown Engineer Company has been largely increased in strength. The establishment after this, not further orders, will be 1 sergeant, 4 lieutenants, 7 sergeants, 12 corporals, 1 trumpeter and 80 sappers, a total of 106 of all ranks. The former total strength of the company was 42. The 82nd infantry battalion is to be also increased by the addition of one company.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—A messenger arrived in hot haste this forenoon from the farm of Benjamin Heitz, Esq., on the St. Peter's Road, announcing the fall of a large building and the death or serious injury of several men. Dr. Kelly drove to the farm as quickly as possible, to find that the men had escaped with a few bruises. It appears that Mr. Egan, with a party of men, were engaged in removing an old barn, to which it was proposed to erect a new addition. A number of men were working in and about it, and the cellar which was being dug, when all at once the old building fell. That no one was seriously hurt is miraculous.

She sailed at 10.30 this forenoon for St. John's, Nfld., via North Sydney, with a cargo consisting of 20 head cattle, 70 sheep, 40 tubs butter, 6 cases boots and shoes, 48 rolls leather, 150 bags oats and sundry other freight. Mr. Parker Carvell and Mr. E. K. McKenny were out-ward passengers.

C. M. B. A.—The financial report of this association shows the total amount received from 1st July, 1894 to 1st July '95, from branches for the beneficiary fund, was \$304,534.39, from which has been paid out \$289,341.74, leaving a balance of \$22,232.22 to be carried over. The largest branch in membership is No. 1, Windsor, Ont. The 170 branches have 16,934 members, 166 in Ontario have 6,186 members, 63 in Quebec have 2,224 members, 19 in New Brunswick 27 members, 17 in Nova Scotia have 754 members, 6 in Prince Edward Island have 156 members, 5 in Manitoba have 282 members, 5 in North-west Territories have 101 members. In his annual address of last year, the President said that the progress reported in the order has continued steady, and the members had every reason to be satisfied. During the term which closed with this convention, 3,660 new members have been received. Hon. Mr. Hackett, of Quebec, has been elected President for the ensuing year, and Dr. Bellevue, of Shediac, Vice President.

Sir,—While congratulating the City Council upon accepting the park roadway programme so persistently advocated by the Government as published in THE WEEKLY EXAMINER of today's date, I have one suggestion to make which will add much to the beauty of the surroundings and to the city's advantage. I refer to Government Pond which in its present state is a standing disgrace. I would recommend that about one foot of soil be taken from the bottom of the pond, especially the southern portion, and used as filling for the roadway and that the sea water be given free access to the pond at every tide. This would convert a stinking stagnant pool into a refreshing healthy stream and at a cost amounting to a comparatively nothing.
