

Proposed Fish Plant Seen Employing 400

SUMMERSIDE — Work started Wednesday at Summerside's Queen's Wharf on an expansion program that is expected to culminate in one of the largest and most modern fisheries processing plants in Eastern Canada, employing between 300 and 400 persons about eight months of the year.

The announcement that this project was in the planning stage was made official last month by Dr. Orville Phillips, the part of rural school districts to form themselves into regional high school units is a "great, progressive movement," the government intends to continue promotion of this movement by providing leadership and the necessary financial assistance.

Expanded efforts in respect to the development of physical fitness are forecast. Through the province's rehabilitation program, the service for crippled persons will be extended to include the provision of artificial limbs and similar appliances at no direct cost to the patient.

The government will also enter into a new agreement with the federal government to provide this province's share of increases in old age assistance, and blind persons' allowances, and to further increase the maximum incomes allowed while receiving such benefits.

Getting brief mention was the proposed Prince Edward Island - New Brunswick causeway. Lieut-Gov. Hyndman said his government is satisfied with federal progress so far on causeway studies and awaits "with ever increasing hopefulness" a favorable report on "this immense project."

The Speech from the Throne also indicated that at the present session a report from the Royal Commission on Electoral Reform will be received.

tained 60 paragraphs and about 3,300 words, 20 paragraphs longer than last year's speech. Mr. Matheson said last night that the main opposition attack will come when the government seeks approval of its budgetary estimates for the coming fiscal year.

It had been expected since the special session of the legislature last December that this session would see the introduction of legislation designed to promote industrial development in the province. There was no hint of this in the Speech from the Throne.

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said outside the House yesterday that two existing acts dealing with industrial development would be amended during the session.

Health services available in the province is now underway, and that the recommendations of the Committee making the survey will form the basis of new programs directed toward the improvement of health services.

Consideration will be given to extending rural electrification into less-densely-populated areas of the province.

The speech contained the hope that it may soon be possible to construct a residence for male students of Prince of Wales college.

Believing that farmers want additional agricultural information, the government will promote "with increased vigor" agricultural education, through its extension services department.

As an incentive to the dairy industry, the government intends to provide bonuses for high-scoring cheese.

Leadership and assistance is promised in the production of high quality beef. Increased financial assistance to rural fairs and livestock exhibitions is promised. The program of fishery training courses is to be expanded. It was also stated that efforts are underway to secure the co-operation of the Atlantic Provinces and the appropriate federal departments to establish a Technical Institute of Fisheries in the Maritimes to train technicians and to translate the findings of scientific research into practical application at the industry level.
