Kensington Town Council Reports Surplus For 1953

The February meeting of the Kensington Town Council was held on Monday evening in the Town Hall with Mayor W. H. Darrach presiding and all councillors present.
 Mayor Darrach reported that according to the financial report for 1953 the town had a surplus of \$10,195.53.
 In the matter of the caution light that the town proposes to install at the intersection of the Summerside-Charlottetown highway, it was decided to go ahead with installation of the light. Councillor P. J. Kennedy reported the cost to be in the vicinity of \$275.00.
 A delegation from the Men's Association of the United Church waited on the council, proposing that in the event of the former post office building being purchased by the town, it would be kept for public service, such as a public library etc. The council stated that it had not considered buying up to the present as the building has not yet been declared surplus.
 Bills amounting to \$211.98 were voted to be paid. Councillor E. Champlain recommended that as an aid to a more efficient fire alarm an electric switch be installed at the residence of Mr. Lorne Dunning and also that a suction hose be repaired.
 Correspondence was read from a firm of consulting engineers in Nova Scotia requesting the town to consider plans and profiles for a water and sewerage system for the town, which they have been working on.
 A letter was also read from an insurance company giving the rates of group insurance for the Fire Department.
