EX PRESIDENT KRUGER.

A Changed Man—Why the Boers Continue to Fight.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Lorenzo Marques, dated September 15, describes a visit of the correspondent of that paper to the Governor's residence for the purpose of interviewing President Kruger. The latter did not receive the correspondent, but deputed Mr. Berdell, the Transvaal commissioner of police, to answer questions. Mr Kruger sat in an adjoining room, with the door open. The correspondent describes him as white, shrivelled, and pitiable, yet a striking object. He has grown a full beard, and he wore spectacles, and one of his eyes was shaded. Mr Berdell said that Mr Kruger had not arranged definitely to go to Europe. If he went he might return in six months. He had not resigned the Presidency of the Transvaal. Vice-president Schalkburger's appointment as acting President in the President's absence was according to custom.

In reply to a question why the Boers continued fighting, Mr. Berdell said:—"We are fighting for our birthright, our country. Accordingly we are compelled to fight to the last drop of blood. It is not useless to continue. We must fight to the bitter end. If we desert, St. Helena or Ceylon is facing us. We shall fight and hope on."

Referring to General Roberts' recent proclamation, Mr. Berdell said it was all wrong, adding:—"General Roberts has not done with us in the field yet. At the worst he may conquer us but he will never subdue us."
