MEMBERS IN QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.—Three of the Island boys attended the above University during the last term. At the last convocation the degree of B. A. was conferred on Mr. John McLeod, of Belfast. Throughout the whole course he maintained the Island reputation. Mr. Malcolm McKinnon has successfully completed his second year. Mr. John McKinnon, who matriculated last September, taking the M. C. Exam on Scholarship value \$50, has now completed his first year, taking the Glass Memorial value \$35, with exemption from fees. He has certainly increased the Island reputation in the above University. The two latter are sons of William McKinnon, of Brown's Creek.

The examination into the charge of murder preferred against Roger Amireau was concluded at Digby, N. S., on Friday last. The evidence, though almost entirely circumstantial, was very strong against the prisoner, and there is very little doubt but that he will be handed over to the United States authorities for punishment. His Honor, Judge Savary, held that his position in this case was similar to that of a justice presiding over a preliminary examination, or a grand jury when examining witnesses on a bill of indictment. He was not called upon to decide as to the guilt or innocence of Amireau, but only as to whether there was sufficient evidence to warrant his extradition to the United States. His Honor will make a report of the proceedings to the Minister of Justice who will inform the Secretary of State of the United States whether Amireau will be given up to the Massachusetts authorities.
