Summerside Town Manager Appointed Last Evening

That Mr. J. A. Brophy of Bridgeport, N.S., be employed as Town Manager for Summerside, at a salary of \$7,500.00 per year was unanimously approved at a special meeting of the Town Council held in the Council Chambers last evening and presided over by His Worship Mayor W. A. Currie. All councillors were present.

Mayor Currie stated that Mr. Brophy has almost identical qualifications to those of R. J. MacKenna of Murdochville, Quebec whose application was approved by council early in July but who was unable to accept the position as Summerside's Town Manager due to an earlier commitment.

The application of the Irving Oil Company Ltd. for a permit to erect a bulk storage plant on a property at the west end of Summerside was refused in a resolution passed last evening which read in part as follows: "Whereas several property holders of the said town have voiced their objections to members of the Town Council against the erection of such a plant on the grounds that fire insurance rates might greatly increase in the event of an explosion, and also for reasons of additional hazards involved through the installation of oil tanks near the business section, resolved, that on account of the objections received from the citizens and property holders, the Town Council of the Town of Summerside not give favor to the application of the Irving Oil Ltd. for the present time at least."

Coun. Jenkins made slight objection to the way in which the residents who oppose the bulk storage plant have made known their objections. He stated that there should be written objections by these residents in order that they can be placed on record, rather than the vocal type which Council members have been receiving.

This way, he said, "We can tell the citizens whether there was one objection or a dozen."

Coun. Clark concurred in this objection and stated that it was not his intention or wish to vote against the resolution but would wish that those who opposed the plant write their objections and send them to Council. Mayor Currie stated he would make a request that those in opposition write a letter to Council.

NAVAL CADET BARRACKS

The Council also granted the request of the P. E. I. Division of the Navy League of Canada for a strip of land known as the "Old Airport" for the purpose of erecting a Naval Cadet barracks. It read as follows: "The P. E. I. Division of the Navy League of Canada has requested the Town Council of the Town of Summerside to grant the league a strip of land from that parcel of land owned by the said town and known as the "Old Airport" for the purpose of erecting thereon a naval barracks and that band concerts would be furnished the town by the Sea Cadet Band to the extent of 20 band concerts over a period of two years in lieu of cash consideration for deed to the said strip of land, 260 feet by 184 feet and whereas this land is now under lease for farming purposes and whereas the said Navy League is prepared to enter into an agreement with the lessees with respect to the present crop of agricultural products, resolved, that the Town Council grant the request of the Navy League to the said Navy League meets with the approval of the present lessees."

War Claims Commissioner Addresses S'ide Rotarians

Speaking on the theme "Canadian War Claims", Hon. Thane Campbell told the Summerside Rotary Club about his work with this committee at the weekly lunch meeting yesterday. He told the gathering that they have processed approximately 10,000 of the 11,000 cases which have been filed with the government. The claims are listed under four categories, mal-treatment, personal injury, death and property loss.

Discussing some of the problems involved, Rotarian Thane stated that the first is to establish the status of the claimant. Under the Canadian scheme the claimant must be a Canadian at the time of the loss, and also at the time of making the claim. One of the chief regulations on which payments are made, he said, is that no claim would be considered if satisfaction were otherwise provided. If compensation was received from any other source, then the committee would not consider the claimant eligible. Some of the other sources would be war risk insurance and ex gratia grants from the United Kingdom to losers from the torpedoing of the S. S. Lithuanian, which covered seventy-five per cent of personal losses, excluding currency diamonds and furs.

Recently other countries have set up funds to pay losses which occurred within their countries. Italy established a fund of 290 million Lira, Belgium, France, Netherlands and West Germany have agreed to establish funds and Japan, the Philippines, Malaya and Batavia are working towards that end.

The amount of the Canadian fund was established at 14 million dollars and up to the present time claims totalling eleven to twelve of this amount have been filed. It is apparent the fund will not provide the full amount, they are being pro-rated with the first three categories being paid in full and a limit of \$10,000 being placed on property claims. The committee was expected to complete its work November 30, 1956, although it now looks as if its work might never be completed, the guest speaker said.
