## RUSHING THE WAR PREPARATIONS.

## The French Government Make Experiments.

### THE NEWSPAPERS REQUESTED BY THE WAR OFFICE

Not to Publish News Useful to Prospective Enemies.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Nov 1.—The Daily Mail this morning publishes no news regarding England's war preparations, explaining that the silence is due to a letter from the War Office asking it not to publish anything which might be useful to a possible enemy.

The Daily Mail confirms the report of exceptional activity at the French dockyard, notably at Toulon, where the coast forts have been experimenting with melinite shells against an old gunboat.

Most of the papers are full of the alleged war preparations, despite the undoubted fact that the authorities are doing their best to discourage their publication, and are even denying statements that have already appeared.

Yesterday a sudden order was received at Dover for an experimental mobilization of the defence forces.

All heights and forts were smartly occupied in a manner giving full satisfaction.

### Americanizing Cuba.

### Japanese Cabinet Resign.

YOKOHAMA, Nov 1.—The Japanese Cabinet has resigned, ministers being unable to agree upon the question of filling the portfolio of education.

This first attempt at party government in Japan has proved a failure. It is probable that the next cabinet will be a coalition of the liberal and clan leaders.

### CAN WATER COMMISSIONERS RESIGN?

SIR.—Your correspondent Lex states that "usage and common law practice enables a person elected to a public position to resign and that the Water and Sewerage Act gives that common law principle the fullest recognition." With the greatest respect for your correspondent, I must tell him that he is in error. The common law does not enable a person elected for a term to a public position to resign. Hence it is that a member of the Parliament of Great Britain cannot resign his membership. By statute, however, the acceptance of an office will vacate a seat, and a member desiring to leave applies to the Government for an appointment, which is always given him, and which he resigns the next day after his object is attained. In Canada provision is made by statute for a member to resign a seat in the House of Commons. In this Province provision is also made by statute for a member of the Legislature to give up his seat, and in the city of incorporation a power is given enabling a City Councillor to resign, and the mode and manner of so doing is pointed out, even to the payment of a fine for the privilege. In the Water Commissioners Act no such provision is made, and the power to resign not being a common law right and not being given by Statute, it follows that the Water Commissioners cannot voluntarily resign. In the present instance, however, the Legislature has not only not given the Commissioners a right to resign but has declared and enacted that they shall (which I understand to be an imperative word) hold and continue in office until February 1902.

The arguments advanced by your correspondent that a right to resign does exist might have been fairly put forward to the Legislature to induce that body to give the power in the act. As it is, they may be used as illustrating the bungle made in the drawing and passing of the act.

In the material care and anxiety of the Legislature that Mr. Laird should not run the chance of losing his seat at an election, that body, of course knowing the common law, legislated him into office for a given period. That period has not expired, and no provision was made to vacate the seat in the meantime. This is the whole case in a nut shell, and it will require an act of the Legislature to relieve Mr. Laird from the duties of Water Commissioner. To obtain that act Mr. Laird and the citizens must wait until the Legislature meets next spring unless the Farquharson Government follows the example of their Liberal brothers in Ontario and calls a special session to amend their bungling legislation.

### SUPREME COURT.

The Michelsmas term of the Supreme Court met this forenoon at eleven o'clock, all the judges present.

### GOV. TANNER'S STAND.

Will Not Allow the Importation of Foreigners Into Illinois.

CHICAGO, Oct 29.—A special to the Times-Herald from Madison, Ill, says: "I reiterate that I will not tolerate this wholesale importation of foreigners into Illinois. And if I hear that a mob is to be brought into this state, such as was taken into Virdeu, I care not on what railway it comes or for whom, I will meet it at the state line and shoot it to pieces with Gatling guns."

So declared Governor Tanner in a speech delivered before 1,200 auditors gathered at the Knights of Pythias hall in this city. It was the concluding statement in an address largely devoted to the defence of his course in the recent mine riots at Virdeu. The Governor viewed at great length the causes leading up to the rioting. He held the operators at fault in their dealings with the strikers and then, reverting to his acts when the crisis came, said: "When the United States Government found it necessary and deemed it just to forbid the importation of foreign labor into this country I feel that I was fully justified in the course I took at Virdeu."
