## THE TEACHERS CONVENTION.

### Government Censured.

A LIVELY DISCUSSION AND STRONG RESOLUTIONS.

A Commission Demanded for Investigation of Educational Matters.

Convention opened at 2 o'clock. The following resolutions were adopted:

1. That this convention considers that Campbell's Geography, now in use, should be revised both as to subject matter and maps or that a new text book be authorized as soon as practicable.

2. That this convention considers that the first part of Evangeline in addition to the English prescribed for the sixth reader is sufficient for English for entrance this year.

3. That in repealing the supplementary clause, and thus withdrawing the strong inducement which that clause had held out to school districts to vote supplementary to their teachers, the government has destroyed a very important principle of the Public Schools Act, and has so mutilated that Act as to seriously impair its efficiency; and further, that in so greatly reducing the already exceptionally small salaries of our teachers, not only without making any provision by which the deficiency might be made good but in such a manner as to ensure a still further reduction on the part of the school districts, the Government has not only shirked its responsibility and done the teachers an injustice but has also inflicted a lasting injury upon the educational interests of the province.

4. That the government be requested to appoint a commission to enquire into the financial matters of our educational system, the Government to appoint one of the commission, the Association another, and they the third, the government to bear the expenses of the said commission.

5. That it is desirable that a spelling book be authorized for our schools.

An animated discussion took place on the resolution re the supplementary clause. Premier Farquharson and D. A. McKinnon were present and took part, explaining the government's position on the matter. The government was strongly criticised for its action by President Campbell and Mr Kiely both of whom announced themselves as Liberals, also by Messrs Seaman, Fraser, and others. A very exciting hour was spent on the matter during which the Premier and Mr McKinnon had the educational side of the question impressed upon them.

The report of the auditing committee showed a balance of \$195.55 in the funds of the Association.
