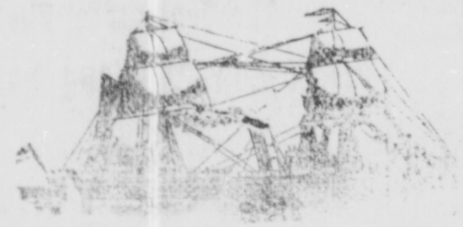

TURN THE RASCALS OUT.

THERE are some Liberals who detest deception and abhor political corruption, who despise such meanness and rascality as was practised in respect to Mr. Wise's resignation and such treachery and baseness as was shown in the case of Pineau, and yet hesitate to break the party tie. By their newspapers and friends—some of whom, perhaps, hold office—they are constrained to palliate their party's offences and to doubt the scandalous facts stated by the Opposition. They condemn the government; but they cannot, persuade themselves that they ought to "turn the rascals out." For them the name of Liberal is a spell which binds them to the support of even such unpopular men as Premier Farquharson. The Liberal Party gave us Responsible Government and Free Education when we were young; therefore we must continue to support "the Liberal Party" now that we are old. This argument is conclusive to elderly gentlemen, like Mr. Robert Stevenson, who live in the past. But it ought to have no influence whatever over those who live in the present and for the future. The party which traffics with Pineau is as much like that which gave us Responsible Government and Free Education as a wolf is like a thorough-bred horse. There is nothing in common between Edward Whelan and Donald Farquharson, between George Coles and Pineau. The leaders of the Liberal party of to-day ought not to be kept in office on account of the good works of the grand old Liberal party—the party supported by THE EXAMINER and by honest and generous men looking to the future welfare of the people of the province.

We sympathize with those for whom party ties are strong. We admire men who are steadfast to their party as long as honorable men can be steadfast. But we submit that the political situation of this Province and the recent dishonorable acts of the irresponsible Government are such as to make it a duty incumbent upon honest and patriotic men to vote down the Pineau Farquharson combination.

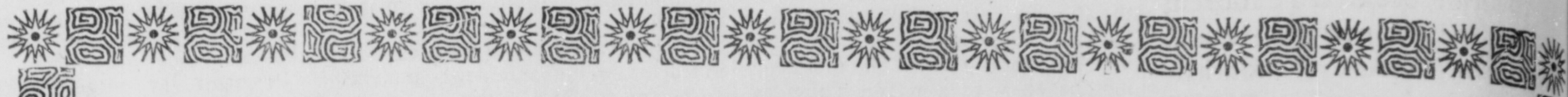
A BAD BARGAIN.

In the House of Commons, on Tuesday last, the Minister of Railways stated that a railway bridge across the Hillsborough river would, of itself, cost \$650,000. Mr. Martin promptly pointed out that the total estimated cost of the bridge, including the accommodation for vehicles and foot passengers, was \$750,000—the difference being but \$1,000,000. Yet the people of Prince Edward Island are compelled to pay \$9,750.00 a year for all time to come, or when capitalized, about \$350,000, for what will only cost the Dominion Government but \$1,000,000! Surely this is a bad bargain for the province—even though the Province were not by the terms of the agreement bound to provide for the protection and safety of passengers and to keep the traffic roadway planked!

NO COMPARISSON.

THE Liberal leaders make a great mistake when they try to place the farmer-candidate in the same condemnation as Pineau. When Mr. Wise found that he could no longer support the Government, he resigned the trust confided to him by his Liberal constituents and stipulated for a new election; Pineau did not resign—he used the trust received from the Government's opponents to keep the Government in office. There is no similarity between the two cases. Pineau acted the part of a traitor; Mr. Wise that of an honorable man who had been deceived.

—The Toronto Globe approves of the emergency rations; but the Huntingdon Gleaner, an honest Liberal paper, says "A McGill professor testified that the stuff was useless as an emergency ration, that it would take eight or nine boxes to keep a man going for a day, and another chemist who had analyzed a boxful, gave like testimony. The idea that a package of concentrated food be placed in the knapsack of every soldier, to keep him in life should regular rations fail, is an excellent one. The evidence given proved beyond contradiction that the power supplied by the bogus Vitaine Company was not such a food, that it was not even as nutritious as peameal or bean flour, and as a pick-me-up to a starving soldier a mockery. For this stuff, valued by himself at 30c a pound, Dr. Devlin charged the Militia Department \$2 a pound, and got the money. Even the tin boxes used were a delusion, being neither air nor water-tight." The Gleaner maintains that the money should be refunded.
