Augustine Cove Camp Committee Annual Meeting

at the annual meeting of the management committee of the Augustine Cove camp held recently in Charlottetown.

Splendid 10-day camps were held in July and August for girls of 12-18 years; for boys of the same ages; week-end camps for young people; and most successful venture, a five-day camp for junior boys of 9-11 years.

Before the camping season opened the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare pronounced that the drinking water at camp was good, well-balanced and well-prepared. Meals were provided, and only pasteurized milk was used.

When Augustine Cove camp was established in 1946 a large dining hall with attached kitchen and three cabins were built. A combination canteen and cottage was added later, since that time two more cabins were erected, and some tents used each year to house large camps.

The management committee met at the camp in late June to decide upon a permanent camp plan and adequate insurance. In August and September the plan was carried out, the ground was levelled and the cabins moved to cement foundations in a shallow semi-circle at the back of the camp property. When moving began some cabins were in need of repairs because of the type of temporary foundations used.

The combination cabin is now a regular cabin; a small new cabin has been built for the exclusive use of the cooks; and many other repairs and improvements including painting are completed.

In June the pump was brought up to Department of Health and Welfare standards. A driveway is staked out; a tree planting program arranged for; splendid play space is now centrally located; the right of way from the highway to the shore has been widened and graded. Total costs of repairs and building is in the vicinity of \$800, and appeal for funds is being made this autumn.

Augustine Cove camp is now one of the finest in the Province, for the use of youth of all churches, co-operatively owned by the United Churches and the Baptist Churches of Prince Edward Island, it is ready to serve youth with good facilities and trained capable leadership.

Officers of the management committee were re-elected: Chairman, David W. Murphy, Cape Traverse; vice chairman, Rev. Howard Christie, Hunter River; sect-treas. Mrs. T. J. Humphrey, Kensington; treasurer of the building fund, Miss Marguerite Brehaut, Charlottetown; commit-

tee for financial support, Miss Brehaut, R. J. Rupert, Charlottetown; William Moase, Summerside; Colin Waugh, Wilmot Valley; with power to add additional members.
