Sealers Planning To Use Aircraft

Guardian-Patriot Staff Writer Unqualified pilots with planes not properly equipped for conditions on the dangerous ice-pan landing strips may cause air mishaps over the sealing grounds next month, Robert J.

Melville, Tryon, said yesterday. Mr. Melville is one of the pioneers in locating seals by air, and air-lifting the pelts to land. He is a qualified bush pilot, and has an aircraft that is specially built for heavy work and quick take-offs.

His craft can land on a stretch 300 to 400 feet in length, while a regular small craft requires between 500 and 600 feet. Landing and take-off conditions are such that the plane must rise above eight to ten feet of ice ridges after leaving the pan, or come in over the same heights.

Driver Fined At S'side

SUMMERSIDE — One of the smallest dockets for some time faced Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's Court yesterday. George Robert Aremault, of Alma was fined \$75 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol.

Alberton detachment RCMP withdrew a charge laid under the highway traffic act against a resident of O'Leary. R.C.M.P. stated the charge was laid in 1959 and accused left the province shortly afterwards, and has not returned.

One accused was remanded in custody without plea on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than residence. The case was adjourned to Feb. 19. One accused was fined \$5 and costs for failing to stop for a stop sign.

Gov't To Discuss Plan For Rebates

The request of the P.E.I. Hospital Association that the provincial government assign its hospital insurance premium rebates to the association will be discussed by cabinet, Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Weige said yesterday.

In a brief submitted recently to the cabinet, the association said it was beginning a drive to have all persons who qualify for a rebate assign the rebate to the association for distribution to Island hospitals.

The Hospital Services Commission next month expects to rebate about \$600,000 in insurance premiums, which were paid in advance of November 30. The association asked the government to take the lead in the campaign by assigning rebates the department of welfare will receive on premiums paid in advance for welfare cases.

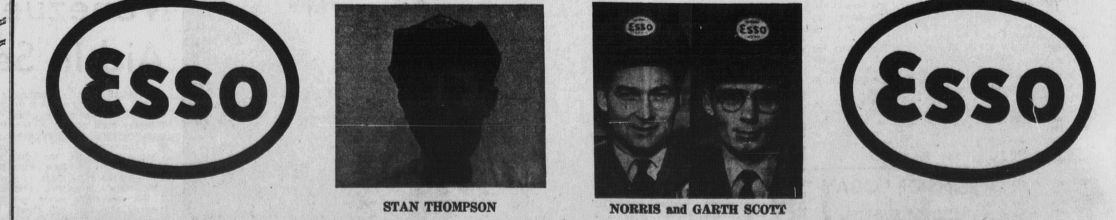


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
