## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Jan. 13.

The Bank of Montreal sold over \$100,000 worth of Canadian Pacific land grant bonds yesterday—the largest sale any day since the opening. At a meeting of the Canada Pacific Railway Directors yesterday, it was resolved not to build the contemplated branch to Sault Ste. Marie, but that a connection would be made with the Chicago and North-Western Railway instead; and while the line along the north shore of Lake Superior is in progress, swift steamers will be used by the company to carry freight from Algoma Bay to Chicago and to Thunder Bay.

### UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.

Davidge continued his argument for the prosecution in the Guiteau case to-day. Guiteau apologized to Davidge for his denunciation of the latter but declined to withdraw anything he had said of Corkhill. Davidge dwelt upon the fact that the prisoner when on the stand has shown wonderful memory, logic, reason and intellectual ability, all tending to refute the theory of insanity. He reviewed that portion of the testimony bearing upon the prisoner's moral character as evidenced in his past life. "All this time" said counsel "no one accused him of insanity." In the estimation of his friends and family he was sane enough for all transactions of life; but when his hand is red with blood, and outaged law claims him as a sacrifice on the altar of justice we first hear of insanity." During the argument Guiteau made constant interruptions which were adroitly turned by the counsel with telling effect against the prisoner. Reed begins his opening argument for the defence to-morrow.

### NEW YORK, Jan. 13.

The Chicago express train leaving Albany at 2.40 this afternoon with many members of the legislature on board was run into by the Tarry town special train, about quarter of a mile east of Spuyten Duyvil Junction, with Harlem mail. The two rear cars (Wagner's drawing-room cars) of the Chicago express telescoped and were set on fire. Reported seven bodies taken from the wreck. Senator Wagner it is feared is burned. Every available ambulance sent to the scene of the accident from Bellevue and New York hospitals. It is reported Sweeney of the New York "Times" was killed.

### LATER.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.

Nine dead bodies have been recovered. Mr. Park Valentine, 21 years old, and his wife, 19 years old, of Remington, Vt., are among the killed. They were married on Wednesday, and were en route to Florida on their bridal tour.

### EUROPEAN.

TUNIS, Jan. 13.

General Logerot's column arrived at Sfax on the 6th inst.

LONDON, Jan. 13.

The Coroner's jury returned a verdict of "wilful murder" against Dr. Lawson in causing the death of his brother-in-law, a young student named Percy Johns.

The British barque "Norton," from Dalhousie, N. B., for Whitehaven, was abandoned Dec. 3rd. She has been towed into Falmouth.

PARIS, Jan. 13.

Gaston and another man representing themselves as Americans, have robbed a jeweller in the Rue Quatre Septembre of valuables amounting to nearly 250,000 francs.

DRESDEN, Jan. 13.

Five of the thirty-nine persons accused of distributing socialistic election proclamations, have been found guilty. The severest sentence imposed was four months imprisonment.

BERLIN, Jan. 13.

The motion of Herr Windthorst abrogating the law forbidding the exercise of ecclesiastical functions without Government authorization, was read a second time in the Reichstag yesterday, 233 to 115. Three orders of the day, introduced by Imperialists, Conservatives, and National Liberals were rejected.

MADRID, Jan. 13.

The El Liberal publishes a letter from Francis of Bourbon, cousin of King Alfonso, suggesting that England should cede Gibraltar to the Pope, if she declines to restore it to Spain.

LONDON, Jan. 13.

The Times' Berlin despatch says the collective note of France and England to the Khedive is viewed by the Foreign Office here as a grave diplomatic mistake, which England will rue sooner or later. A Constantinople despatch says the Sultan called a meeting of the Cabinet to consider the Anglo-French note concerning Egypt. The sitting lasted until an early hour this morning. It is rumored that the Porte will address a protest to the Powers, as the Sultan is jealous of his Suzerain prerogatives.

TRIPOLI, Jan. 13.

Three French missionaries have been murdered near the oasis of Gladames in the desert of Sahara. The chief of the assassins is said to be Caid of Ghadames who was concerned in the massacre of the French exploring expedition under Col. Flatters near Assime in February last.

LONDON, Jan. 13.

Gladstone, speaking at a "Rent-day" dinner at Hawarden, deprecated the idea of introducing the principle of the Land Court Bill in England, but it was necessary he said to cheapen and facilitate

## transfer of land. Reform of parliamentary procedure he said was the first question, after which there was nothing to prevent the endeavor the Government intended to make in dealing with County Government.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—“Liberal” in your issue of the 13th is no doubt a very intelligent person, i. e., judging from his strictures on the action of temperance men in connection with the Act of 1878. But “Liberal” must allow that there are equally intelligent people on the other side, who are evidently possessed of as much sound common sense as he appears to possess. He declaims against the temperance men as being “fanatics,” because they have made an effort on their part to suppress one of the vilest of the vile traffic that curses this earth.

Surely “Liberal” must be aware of the fact that the blame does not rest on the temperance men more than any other person, because the Act is not so thoroughly operative as it ought to be. But I contend that the whole blame rests on those who condone the traffic and are using their efforts to defend it in its operation, and not only they, but those higher in authority who from time to time have failed to reach a decision in the case of the Appeal from Federation. Let “Liberal,” when trying to show his hand in this matter, take the proper authorities to task, and let them have the benefit of those strictures. Then we will have a better opportunity of judging of his ability to effect a still greater reform.

## Is Guiteau Insane?

The following “incident” is from the proceedings in the Court on January 7:—

Guiteau pretended to read a letter, but in reality was carefully listening to Davidge.

The few interruptions made were unnoticed by counsel, save when Guiteau said: “I didn't know the difference between right and wrong. I had no choice. If I had I would not have done it.”

Davidge answered: We will come to that by and by.

Judge Porter relieves Davidge and read from newspaper slips Judge Davis', of New York, charge to the jury in the Coleman murder case.

Scoville, with some impatience, objected to any more dramatic efforts on the part of Porter, which were intended for effect on the jury, and insisted that Porter might as well read a stump-speech to the jury. He knew it had no bearing upon the case.

“Of course he knew it,” Guiteau shouted, “and more than that, the jury decided the case directly against the charge of the case.”

Porter repelled the insinuation, and insisted that the farce so long enacted by the counsel for the defence must now stop. If not rebuked by the court it would be by others.

Judge Cox ended the dispute by saying that the matter read was undoubtedly authority. Its applicability to this case could be commented on by the counsel at the proper time.

As Davidge resumed after Judge Cox's ruling, Guiteau shouted, “I want to get this thing right before the jury. Every one knows all about that case. The jury gave a verdict against that charge and this prosecution knows it well.”

The effect was electrical, when Davidge, in a most deliberate and earnest manner, said: “Your Honor, this man was for three weeks held up to us as an embeiler, and now listen to him, he not only knows the difference between right and wrong, but he understands fully the law of this case.”

Guiteau—“Transitory mania, that's my case. I don't pretend I'm insane now. I've got as good a head as you or Porter either. Scoville is a fool in thought, and I repudiate him and his whole theory of defence. All that I want is two hours before that jury, and I can set this thing all right.” The scene was lively for some minutes.

Judge Cox rapped for order. Guiteau subsided, and Davidge continued without further interruptions.

## Household Hints.

LINIMENT FOR SPRAINS.—Take one ounce each of chloroform, ammonia, sweet oil, and camphor gum. Mix with half a pint of pure alcohol. Shake before using. It is a splendid liniment for family use.

CURE FOR CORNS.—Wet common cooking soda with water, so that it will spread easily on a bit of cloth, and bind it on the corn. Keep it on till the corn is loosened and comes out. It is simple and sure.

FRIZZLED BEEF.—Brown a piece of butter the size of an egg in a saucpan, add a cup of cream or milk, one teaspoonful of flour, mixed with a little cold milk. Have ready a half pound of thinly shaved beef, add it to the mixture, let it just come to a boil; serve.

YEAST THAT WILL NOT SOUR.—Put three quarts of water and two pints loose hops in a pot, boil twenty minutes; put one quart sifted flour in a pan, when hops are boiling fast strain half the hop water on the flour; work down all the lumps you can, then strain the rest boiling; add a small teacup of sugar, same of salt; when cool enough put in yeast to rise it. Put in a small top jar, put where it will be warm until it begins to rise, then tie loosely and put in the cellar, or some cool place. A small cupful is sufficient for six small loaves. Dough made of this yeast will not sour in twenty-four hours.
