## Singapore Winners Deny Communist Tie

SINGAPORE (Reuters) — The leftwing People's Action Party, which swept to overwhelming victory in Saturday's general election, Sunday declared it did not "propose to be, or even appear to be, the handmaid of the Communist party."

Singapore's new constitution, this British island - fortress will become self-governing in everything but defence and foreign affairs.

But in a statement issued after a meeting of its leaders, the party said it intended to drop a purge of Communists begun by the outgoing People's Alliance Party of Chief Minister Lim Yew Hock.

The party was carried to victory Saturday on a wave of anti-colonialism and Southeast Asian nationalism, winning 43 out of 51 seats in the Legislative Assembly.

Other parties, who failed in a last-minute effort to form an anti-P.A.P. front, won the remaining eight seats — the former ruling People's Alliance Party four, the Communist United Malays National Organization three and Independents one.

Former chief minister David Marshall, leader of the tiny Workers' party, was submerged in the victory tide, but Lim was re-elected. The P.A.P. got 281,901 votes out of 590,000 votes cast. About 90 per cent of the electorate voted.

### Education Probe Asked In Quebec

**ST. HYACINTHE, Que. (CP)**—A royal commission enquiry into education in Quebec province was called for Sunday by the Quebec Federation of St. Jean Baptiste Societies.

The federation also said the province needs more immigrants. A resolution passed at the annual convention, held here during the weekend, demanded a royal commission into all levels of education.

The 200,000 - member society suggested that the Quebec government levy a tax on all corporations exploiting the province's natural resources. The money would be used for schools and universities.

The government was also asked to establish immigration bureaus abroad — particularly in Latin countries — "in order to promote selective immigration that will fill the need of employment in the province."

**RATIFY AGREEMENT**  
HAVANA (AP) — The Cuban government Saturday ratified the international sugar agreement drawn up last February in London. The London meeting of the International Sugar Council decided to cut world sugar export quotas up to 7 1/2 per cent.
