A REPRESENTATION of the Crucifixion has been placed in the centre of the new Roman Catholic Cemetery in the Royalty. It is a very striking group of white figures on grey-stone pedestals. The central figure is sharply outlined by the dark cross to which it is nailed. Immediately in front is the figure of St. Mary Magdalene kneeling; on one side that of St. John, and on the other the figure of the Blessed Virgin, all with awe, grief, adoration and love depicted in the faces upturned to the figure on the cross. The whole group is dignified, and is a most imposing object from the road.

The excursion from New Glasgow and Pictou yesterday was a grand success. Some three hundred and twenty people, accompanied by a band of music, came over. Throughout the day they amused themselves in various ways. They were a remarkably respectable and well conducted crowd. In the afternoon the band paraded the principal streets and discoursed some excellent music. In the evening about seven o'clock the fine band of the 82nd Battalion serenaded the excursionists from the wharf. As the steamer left the pier hearty cheers were given for both Charlottetown and New Glasgow bands, as well as for the people of Charlottetown, Pictou and New Glasgow. The visitors express themselves as delighted with their trip, and say they look forward to the next excursion with delightful anticipations.

SCHOONER ASHORE

At Launching Beach.

Probabilities of her Getting Off.

GEORGETOWN, July 27. The schooner Henry Wilson, of Gloucester, Mass., eighty-eight tons, Critchett master, went ashore at Launching Beach, in a thick fog, this morning at one o'clock. The vessel lays easy on a sandy bottom, and may be got off after discharging the cargo. Messrs. A. A. McDonald & Bros., the agents at Georgetown, have sent a schooner to take out the mackerel and barrels. There are 130 barrels mackerel on board. The wind is blowing on shore to-day.

Another Seizure.

SHELBURNE, July 26. Collector Atwood, acting under instructions from Ottawa to-day, formally seized the Gloucester schooner Annie Hodgdon and asked Capt. Morrison to bring his vessel to the wharf, which he immediately did. The vessel now lies moored to the wharf, in charge of officers, under the Collector of Customs. A fine of \$400 has been imposed on her for violating the Customs' laws.

Cricket.

LONDON, July 26. The Canadian cricket team and the Gentlemen of Durham began their match yesterday. In the first inning the Gentlemen of Durham made 271 runs, and the Canadians scored 174 for seven wickets. The Canadians complain that professionals have been played against them in England, which they did not anticipate.

Strengthening the Forts.

BERLIN, July 26. The strengthening of the forts at Cologne has been completed. It is stated that the whole infantry forces will be armed with repeaters by October 1st.
