

Miscellaneous Items.

The Irish relief bill has passed a second reading in the House of Commons.

Leadville miners have unconditionally agreed to resume work at the old prices.

U. S. Gen. Hatch has asked permission of the Government to pursue Victoria's band into Mexico.

De Freycinet declares that the French Government will take an early initiative by proposing a plenary amnesty.

Great astonishment prevails in Berlin at the representations that Austria is animated by anti-Greek sentiments.

Slater Owen, who was on a bridal tour and reported lost with his wife on the Narraganset, has arrived at Plymouth, N. H., all right.

An expedition is being organized in Southern Arizona to take possession of the State of Sonora. The Mexican authorities have been notified.

The Standard's Berlin correspondent asserts that the plain fact is that Turkey defies Europe to carry out the decisions of the Conference by main force.

Five men were killed and three seriously injured in Yellow Jacket Mine says a San Francisco despatch, by a car load of tools falling from the surface to the bottom.

A caravan just arrived at Sha Rud reports that an attack was made recently by the Tekke Turcomans on Koochan. The Tekkes were defeated and dispersed by the Governor's cavalry.

At North Adams, Mass., the strange epidemic is subsiding now. No fears of fatal results are entertained. The town is full of invalids. The physicians believe the epidemic is due to atmospheric changes.

At Russianville, Indiana, James Vogus entered J. Maas' saloon and without warning fired five revolver shots at Jacob Vogus his father. Four bullets took effect and he will die. Vogus was arrested. He says he shot his father because of a property lawsuit.

The National Prohibition Convention met at Cleveland, Ohio, on Thursday; 142 delegates were present. Rev. Dr. Miner, of Massachusetts, presided. The Convention nominated by acclamation, for President, Neal Dow, of Maine, and for Vice President, A. M. Thompson, of Waterville, Ohio. A strong prohibition platform was adopted, in which the right of women to vote on the temperance question is declared.

A Rangoon despatch says: Prince Nyoun Goke gathered 1,500 men and is again stationed a few miles beyond our borders. His force is steadily increasing, but he has no arms or money. The Government has invited him to surrender, and has offered to send him back to Calcutta, but the Prince has not replied. Aburrahman Khan is advancing with troops and sixteen mountain guns. Tribes are gathering north of Cabul, and in other quarters it is reported they look for a proclamation of a holy war.

NAVIGABLE PRAIRIE.—The Winnipeg correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle, writing on the 21st of May, says:—The country within 50 miles west of this is flooded, so much so that the passenger steamer Marquette last week made a straight course across the prairie instead of following the serpentine course of the River Assiniboine. It must be borne in mind that these boats, although carrying hundreds of passengers and an immensity of freight, do not draw so much water as our ocean-going steamers, the average draught being about 18 inches.
