SOURIS — A 64-year-old resident of St. Charles, Peter McCormack, was reported in satisfactory condition in a Halifax hospital last night, where he is undergoing treatment for head injuries. Mr. McCormack suffered the injuries when he slipped and fell on a patch of ice about three weeks ago. Since that time he had been a patient in the Souris Hospital. Halifax hospital authorities disclosed that the injured man was suffering from a blood clot under the skull, as a result of the fall and for now he is being kept under observation. Mr. McCormack was flown to Halifax from Charlottetown yesterday afternoon, by an Albatross aircraft from RCAF Search and Rescue at Greenwood, N.S.

## Montague Town Council Sworn In

MONTAGUE — Mayor Bruce Yeo and members of the Montague Town Council took office Wednesday night when Judge J. S. DesRoches administered the oaths of office and allegiance to the new council. Mayor Yeo after taking office once more extended an invitation to all citizens to approach the council with any problems they may have, and also to attend to any of the council meetings on the second Monday of each month. "Our policy is to make Montague a prosperous and happy town without incurring a prodigious debt which cannot be paid for several generations," the mayor said. "It is possible for a town by excessive borrowing to reach a point where taxes are not sufficient to pay the interest on the debt. In my opinion, citizens do not wish or desire this to happen."

## NEW MAYOR

Dr. A. Kennedy is the newly-elected mayor of Georgetown. He took office this week. He was born in Antigonish, N.S., and graduated from St. Francis Xavier and McGill Universities. Dr. Kennedy has been carrying on a medical practice for 40 years.

## Balroom Dancing Classes Mooted

MONTAGUE — A number of interested citizens have expressed the hope that Miss Evelyn Edgett, Montague, N.B., ballroom dance instructor in the province will visit Montague. Miss Edgett is giving classes in Charlottetown and Summerside, sponsored by the division of physical fitness and designed to fill a physical culture need in the program of studies. A few interested persons in Montague have been endeavoring to find out if a sufficient number would be interested, to form a class of approximately 40 to warrant the conducting of such classes here. This class could consist of high school students and adults from Montague and surrounding areas. It is the opinion that it would be too hard to miss the opportunity of having such a qualified instructor visit Montague. Approximately eight couples from Montague have taken part in the classes in Charlottetown and it is their opinion that several more couples may be interested before Monday night.

## B.C. Lumber Company Pioneers in Packaging

VANCOUVER (CP)—A package-conscious public has something to consider. Lumber now is packaged. It is going to customers in sturdy paper bundles, weather-resistant and handy for storage. The lumber is wrapped in laminated paper which is an asphalt core and bound with steel bands. Rayonier Canada (B.C.) Ltd. is pioneering the new package method as its Marpole sawmill does here. It is the first mill in Canada to employ the paper-packaging process, although a few United States companies are also trying it. Handling adds a little to the price of the lumber, but it brings economies in shipping and handling, especially to the receiver. Only fully-dried B.C. hemlock is being used in the new shipping method. WEIGHT A COST FACTOR Kiln-dried lumber is much lighter than the green variety and can be shipped more economically by rail where rates are based on weight. The packaging is in length from eight to 24 feet. The packages are four feet wide and two feet high and each contains one length. The bundles are squeezed in pneumatic clamps at 20,000 pounds pressure around with the steel bands before they are wrapped in the paper, which develops water resistance from an asphalt core. Peter Sloan, Rayonier vice-president, lumber operations, said in an interview that handling costs should be cut 65 per cent. "The packages can be lifted to flat cars, the paper protecting them on hands to the midwest and eastern U.S." Normally, lumber must be loaded piece by piece into box-cars and unloaded the same way. After the packaged lumber reaches its destination it need not be stored in warehouses; the paper will protect it outdoors for at least six months.
