"Nelson Eddy" Opens "Confederation Celebration" Week At The Prince Edward

The Western breathes new life with every note of Nelson Eddy's songs in "Let Freedom Ring" at the Prince Edward Theatre's offering starting today. Edward Whelan was a loyal and active member of the Benevolent Irish Society of this city and the executive of this Society will be on hand this morning to unveil the plaque to the memory of their beloved member."
