Shortly before our Easter holidays, faculty and students enjoyed a very interesting evening when father William Daly, S.J., gave a lecture on India. Having been there for seven years where he was master of several Jesuit schools, he knew his topic thoroughly, and with his ready wit and masterful description, kept his audience most interested.

The unbelievable poverty of the entire country and its political instability were stressed by Father Daly. His lecture was supplemented by the showing of color films taken in the northern hill districts and in which were captured the beauty of the Himalayan countryside and the strangeness and simplicity of the life of the hill-folk. One shot of an old Tibetan at market, won for him the distinction of publication in a national magazine.

The local selection committee for the International Students Seminar in India has announced that Gerald Steele will represent St. Dunstan's and Prince Edward Island in India this summer. This selection has been ratified by the National Selection Committee in Toronto. With 30 other University students from across Canada and eight professors.

The local delegate will sail from Quebec around May 26th to London for the Coronation ceremonies and then proceed to India by plane where the five-week seminar will take place at Bangalore. Following this, the group will have a six-week tour of sections of South East Asia where they will visit the universities and many development and technical assistance projects.

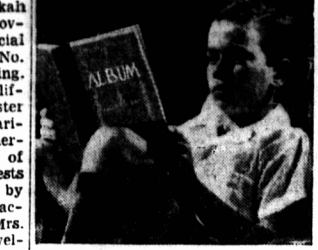
At the close of the regular business of the lodge, Mrs. Crockett addressed the members and visitors. She spoke on the work of the order, the largest fraternal organization in the world.

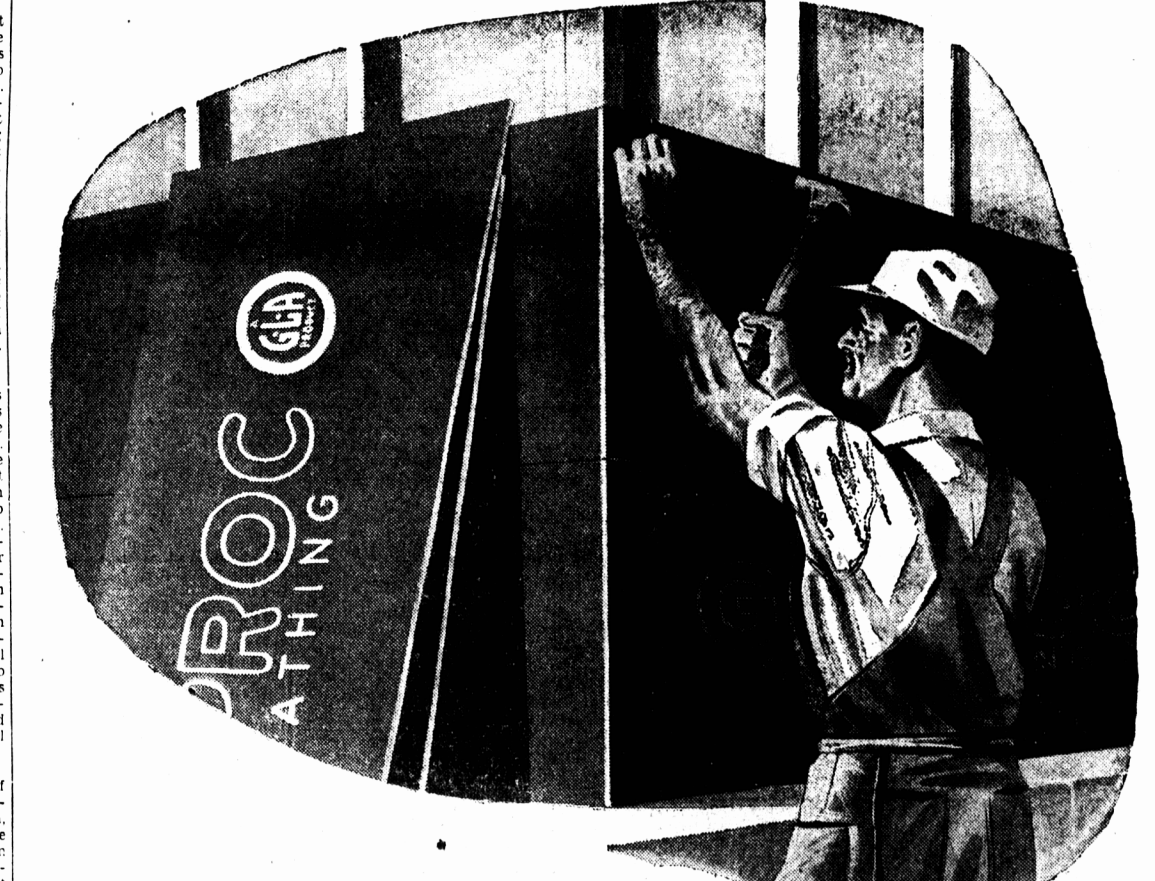

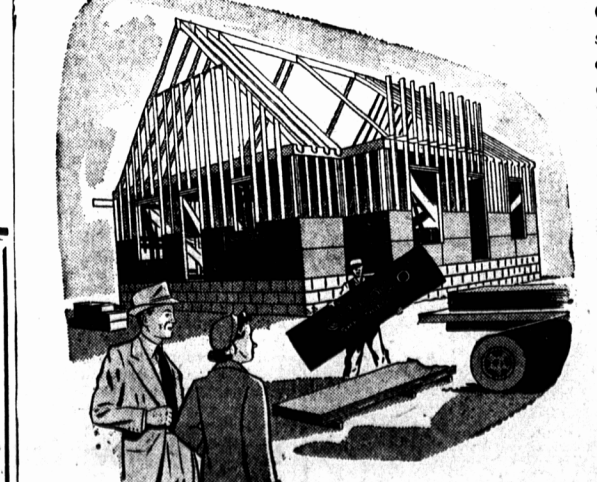
