Hugh Marlowe, as the Hollywood son, writer, and Elsa Lanchester, the American painter of religious scenes, who opens up her stable studio to the ambitious Sisters, help speed along the spirited action and Thomas Gomez' role of the New York gangster furnishes a vivid contrast. Many of the extremely humorous situations in the picture develop when the unsuspecting Sisters come in contact with the sordid methods of gangland and angle with New York traffic cops and the unfamiliar ways of American life. The way they drive a jeep, for example, is one of the funny highlights of the film. But Sister Margaret and Sister Scholastica are equal to every occasion. They have but one goal—that of building a hospital for children—and they overcome every obstacle that is placed in their way. 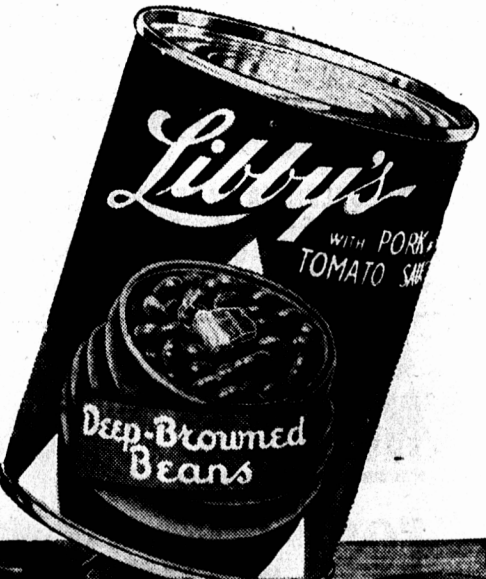
**EXPECT TOURIST RUSH**
