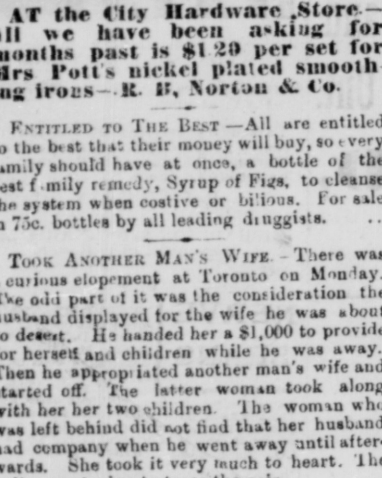

COALS TO SPRINGHILL.—A telegram from Springhill informs us that "a coal famine is imminent, as others besides the employees were not prepared for the emergency. It is probable that coal will be brought in from outside places to prevent suffering if matters do not take a more favorable turn to-day." This is one of the results of the strike which is now "on" at Springhill colliery.

THE FERRY STEAMERS.—As a result of the present cold snap, ice has formed in the harbor between Charlottetown and Southport. Owing to this fact, it took the Elfin over two hours to reach Southport on her first trip this forenoon. But since the passage was made she has been running as regularly as possible.

The Southport made her regular trip to Rocky Point to-day.

THE STANLEY arrived from Pictou about nine o'clock last night, with the Nova Scotia mail and several passengers. She entered the harbor about six o'clock, but laid at anchor for some time, and did not come up to the wharf until the hour above stated. On the trip over she went to the assistance of a schooner flying signals of distress (but which only wanted a tow-boat) and was there detained about half an hour. The weather was stormy and cold throughout the trip. The Stanley did not leave port this morning owing to the heavy northerly snow-storm prevailing.
