

We have inserted in our last page all the particulars which have yet come to hand relating to the massacre of so large a portion of the British army in Western India.

At a Meeting of the Shareholders of the Steam Navigation Company, held in the Court House, yesterday afternoon, the following gentlemen were chosen, by ballot, Directors of the said Company, in addition to two Directors already appointed by Government, viz: The Hon. A deputation from the North American Colonial Association, consisting of Mr. John Masterman, M. P., Mr. Russell (Chairman), Messrs. Gillespie, Bliss, Gould, Brooking, A. Gillespie, jun., Harrison, Carter, and Douse, had an interview, on the 2d instant, with Sir Robert Peel, at his official residence in Downing-street.—London paper.

The following Bills, passed by the House of Assembly in the last session of the Legislature, were not agreed to by the Legislative Council:

- Bill to amend the several Acts relating to Sheriffs, and to regulate the fees by them taken in certain cases.
Bill to further amend the Act for the recovery of Small Debts.
Bill for the regulation of the Fishery Reserves.
Bill to amend the Act for the establishment of a Central Academy.
Bill to amend the Act for establishing the Boundary Lines of Counties and Townships.
Bill to impose a duty on all Spirituous Liquors distilled within this Island.
Bill for the destruction of Ox-eye Daisies.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—The Hon. George Dalrymple, Vice President, delivered a lecture, on Wednesday evening last, on the causes which have contributed to retard the progress of civilization. These he classified under physical and moral influence—the former including "the changes and convulsions which our globe must have experienced at different and remote periods"—the latter comprehending the propositions following:—

- 1. The devastations which barbarians have committed on civilized states.
2. Demoralising consequences of despotic Governments.
3. Influence of war.
4. Trace the origin of that innate cruelty displayed in the human disposition.
5. Influence of superstition and taste.

In illustrating these several topics, the Lecturer displayed much historical research, and enriched his composition with happy classical allusions and ingenious speculations.—The horrors of war were displayed in the most heart-stirring manner—the abominations of despotism were made fairly and happily to contrast with the freedom and security of our own glorious constitution—and the taste of those times when deeds of blood were indispensable to awaken any interest even in the child, or rather when youthful education led the tyrant to admire chivalry and murder—was exhibited as infinitely surpassed by the taste of our own days, and in our own country, where modesty, virtue, and religion are associated in the formation of youthful character.

The evening being very unfavourable and the audience small, a unanimous application was made to Mr. D. to read his Lecture a second time on a more favourable evening.

Mr. Isaac Smith will lecture on Mechanics on Wednesday, 4th May. This being the last of the course of lectures for the present season, the President will close the Institute with a short address upon the present and future prospects of that useful institution.

Legislative Council Chamber, Saturday, 9th April, 1842.

RESOLVED, That the further consideration of the Bill intitled "An Act to further amend an Act made and passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Fourth, for ascertaining the Boundaries of the several Townships in this Island," be deferred until the next Session of the Legislature; and that the same be published three several times in each of the Newspapers; and that Fifty copies of this Act be printed, and be circulated, by means of posting them on the several places of Divine worship, and otherwise, in the Townships affected by the said Bill, in order that parties interested may be notified of the proposed alterations contemplated, in accordance with the Royal Instructions.

AN ACT to further amend an Act made and passed in the Fourth year of the Reign of the late King William the Fourth, for ascertaining the Boundaries of the several Townships in this Island.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, intitled "An Act for ascertaining and establishing the Boundaries of Counties and Townships, and parts of Townships, and for regulating the duties of Surveyors, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned, three Commissioners are authorized to be appointed, whose duty it shall be, when required by parties interested therein, to fix and determine the commencement of the Lines dividing the several Townships into which this Island is divided, and who are by the Seventh Section of the said Act further required, in all cases where any of the said Township Boundary Lines shall run through this Island, to run the same from the points of commencement in each side thereof, to the centre or midway between such points of commencement; and in case the Lines so run shall not meet or correspond with the Original Survey of this Island, the Boundary shall be settled and connected by a Line perpendicular to the said Lines, either North or South, East or West, as the case may be:

And whereas, in carrying into effect the provisions of the said recited Act, it has been ascertained by the Commissioners so appointed, that the Plan of the Original Survey of this Island to which reference is made in the said Act, is in part incorrect and erroneous—more particularly that portion of it representing that part of the Western Coast extending from the West Point to the North Cape; and in consequence of the said error, and which error fully appears by an actual Survey of that part of the said Coast, made by order of the House of Assembly, as well as by reference to the Original Field Book of the said Original Survey, deposited in the Office of the Surveyor General of this Island, to have been made in protracting the said Original Plan,—the different Townships numbered Two, Three, Four, Five, Six and Nine, are more or less inaccurately represented; and it is found impracticable to fulfil the intention of the said recited Act, in regard to the said Townships, without conferring additional powers on the said Commissioners, whereby they may be enabled so to apportion the quantity of Land intended to be included in the Grants of the said Townships respectively, without materially altering the respective fronts of the same on the Sea Coast:

Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, That with respect to the aforesaid Townships—to wit, Numbers Two, Three, Four, Five, Six and Nine, it shall and may be lawful for the said Commissioners, and they are hereby directed, when called upon, according to the provisions of the said herein before recited Act, to cause the Boundary Lines dividing the same, or any two of the same, to be fixed at either end thereof, whether the same shall abut upon the Sea Coast or an Inland Bay, River or Creek, or upon other Townships, and to cause Lines run from the same to be connected by a Line perpendicular to the side Lines, North and South, as the case may be, although the said perpendicular Line shall not be in the centre or midway between said points of commencement: Provided always, that any Township bounding on such Lines as aforesaid, shall not have less than the complement of Acres specified in the Grant thereof; and such Township Boundary Lines, run as herein before directed, shall be final and conclusive between the said Townships—any thing contained in the Seventh Section of the above in part recited Act, intitled "An Act for regulating and establishing the Boundary Lines of Counties and Townships, and parts of Townships, and for regulating the Duties of Surveyors, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned," to the contrary notwithstanding: And provided also, that nothing in this Act contained shall alter or affect, or be construed to alter or affect, any point of commencement of any Township Boundary Lines heretofore ascertained and fixed by the said Commissioners under the authority and by virtue of the power vested in them by the herein before recited Act, or the Act in amendment thereof.

And be it enacted, That the provisions of the Eighth and Ninth Sections of the herein before recited Act shall be construed to apply to all the sub-divisions into which the herein before recited Townships are divided, provided the same be bona fide occupied, possessed, or claimed by any person or persons having legal Title thereto.

ANY person employing, or otherwise harbouring, directly or indirectly, any of my Journeymen or Apprentices, without having obtained from me a legal discharge, will be prosecuted with the utmost rigour of the Law.

The attempt that is daily made by ignorant, needy and dissipated individuals, to separate you from me, will indeed be futile, if there is that natural confidence which, I trust, neither I nor any member of my family have done any thing to forfeit.
