CNR Plans Recovery Derailed Batic Train

Plans are being made to build a new roadbed to rerail the CNR train which left the track one mile east of Baltic on the Elmina line Dec. 12. Edgar Taylor, Island superintendent for the Canadian National Railways said Saturday.

A broken rail caused the deraiment of one engine, three cars and a caboose. The lead engine remained on the track. Due to swampy ground and a high embankment, effort to retrieve the cars were unsuccessful.

Normally, a wrecking engine would be used to rerail the cars, but in this situation two cranes would be necessary and the high embankment makes this method almost impossible.

Mr. Taylor said that the CNR caboose and one car have been recovered and a magad, and that one of the CNR cars still there is a badly smashed one that it will be taken away and scrapped. That leaves the derailed engine and three reefers and box cars to be recovered.

Mr. Taylor reported that plans are being made to build a road bed and tracks from the west on a gradual embankment for 600 feet down to the derailed cars.

Work will begin on this latest recovery attempt as soon as the materials can be collected for the job.

Shaw is Hopeful ADB Will Approve Projects

The granting of \$30,000,000 to New Brunswick for an electrical power development project was viewed Saturday by Premier Walter R. Shaw as "a generous contribution to New Brunswick."

Premier Shaw said "I also see that there is a somewhat similar project for Newfoundland. Now that the bigger projects have been taken care of, I would expect that our representation to the board for assistance will receive favorable consideration."

The government submitted a number of projects to the board in Charlottetown last October, but no decision on the projects by the board has been announced.

Finnish Vessel To Complete Pulpwood Loading At Souris

GEORGETOWN — The Finnish freighter "Atlas" sailed from Georgetown 11 a.m. Saturday for Souris after completing the loading of 2,300 cords of torped pulpwood. She will take on an additional 1,000 cords in Souris.

Although the CCGS Tupper was in port at Georgetown and left just prior to the sailing of the Atlas, the freighter needed no assistance as the harbor is ice free.

The Atlas was the largest and last of the three freighters which arrived here Christmas day. The three ships were all loaded from the Henderson Lumber and Company yard and all the cargoes are destined for overseas markets.

During the loading of the ships no days were lost due to weather conditions although sub-zero temperatures, snow and wind prevailed for much of the time.
