

# Kremlin Starts New Drive To Make Children Reds

The Kremlin's latest move in its unending campaign to make Russians into good Communists is to take the children away from their parents and put them in boarding schools.

This will permit the Communist party to destroy the influence of parents on children. It will also permit Communists to get at the youngsters on a more intensive scale. It will free young mothers for work on farms or in factories. All these are consequences which the Communist party of the Soviet Union ardently desires.

The first boarding schools have

just been started—at the "suggestion" of Communist boss Nikita Khrushchev. Much is being made of the occasion. The Soviet propaganda apparatus is pushing the boarding school program, persuading parents their children won't be mistreated at them demonstrating that life in them is clean and healthy, that the children will be surrounded with love—and above all that the boarding school students will get a superior education which will give them an advantage over home-raised children in later life.

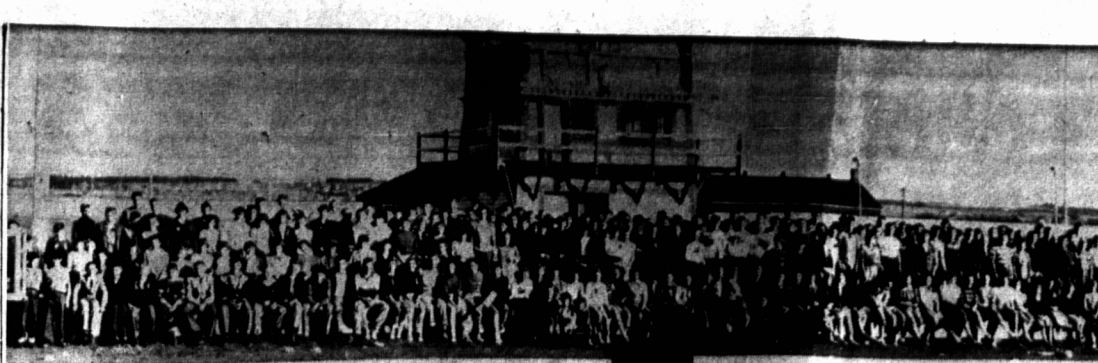
This is a powerful bait. In effect the Soviet press is saying: "Give

us your child and we will see to it that he has a better career than the rest."

The boarding school plan is intended to become, as the Soviet press explains, the basic form of Soviet education.

In other words it will be the ordinary and eventually probably a compulsory form of education.

So far 285 boarding schools have been opened with tens of thousands of pupils. By 1960, about 1,000,000 pupils will be studying in them, according to present plans. Beyond that they will apparently multiply till they crowd out ordinary day schools.

## Former Island Priest Buried in Winnipeg

A priest who worked for 22 years in St. Ignace parish, Father Pius Joseph McLellan, S.J., 78, died Saturday, Aug. 4, 1956 in Winnipeg.

Father McLellan was born in St. George, P. E. I. He attended normal school and was a teacher until he entered the Society of Jesus in 1907.

From 1912 to 1915 he taught at St. Boniface College and was ordained a priest in 1922, after which he went to Loyola College in Montreal as dean of discipline. Three years later he came to St. Ignace and remained until 1931. He then served as a priest at Guelph, Port Arthur, Montreal, Spanish, Ont.

In 1940 he returned to St. Ignace where he worked until his death August 4th.

Requiem Mass was held at St. Ignace Church at 10 a.m. Wednesday. The body was brought to the church Tuesday at 4 p.m. and in the evening priests of the diocese read the office of the dead, followed by parish prayers at 8:30 p.m. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.
