Alberton — William Hayward, manager of the centennial committee and Kenneth Birtwistle, manager of special events, met last evening in Alberton with members of the town council and centennial committee members from all Alberton.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says considerable high cloud lay over the district late Wednesday evening after a very warm day in most parts.

Yarmouth, Nova Scotia chalked up a new record maximum temperature of 79 degrees for June 26 to better the old mark of 76 set in 1941.

A weak area of high pressure lay along the Atlantic seaboard to the Maritime provinces and will result in a westerly flow of

still warmer air, with higher humidities today. Temperatures should rise well into the eighties in inland sections during the day.

However, a weak disturbance in Northern Ontario was moving towards the district and will spread cooler and drier air, with a few showers to some sections late Friday.

Regional forecasts: Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick: Sunny

and very warm with a few cloudy intervals and a few showers. Light winds increasing this afternoon to west 20. Low and high at Sydney 50 and 80, Charlottetown 53 and 78, Moncton 57 and 88, Campbellton 57 and 83.

High tide today at Charlottetown at 8:28 a.m. Summer tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 4:32 and sets at 7:32.

**67,636 IN JAIL**
