SOME EXTRA FINE CATTLE

Messrs Blake Bros., exhibited yesterday on the Market Square four steers fed at the farm of Mr. M. Blake, Davenport, Royalty. The heaviest of the cattle was a pure bred Shorthorn steer, four years old, raised by the late Samuel H. de, of West River, from whom he was purchased by the Messrs Blake about two years ago. The animal weighed 2600 pounds and will dress over 1700 pounds of beef of extra quality. He is pronounced the best and heaviest ever fed on the Island. He has been sold to Mr. Thomas Meigher, of Picton, for the handsome sum of \$200, the highest price ever paid for a fat animal of any kind fed in this province, and will be slaughtered for the Easter market.

The Messrs. Blake intend slaughtering some of the other cattle exhibited for the home market at Easter. They have a good purchase of choice cattle for the Easter market from Mr. D. McKinlay, of North River. Among this lot is a steer one year and ten months old, which is estimated to weigh 1400 pounds, and is considered to be the best animal of his age ever raised on the Island in this province if not in Canada and a choice heifer, the same age, rated to weigh 700 pounds of dressed beef. Mr. McKinlay is one of our leading breeders, and it would pay our farmers to visit his place and inspect his stock, numbering about fifty head. The Messrs. Blake have also purchased something choice in the beef line from Mr. J. Toombs, of North Rustico, which is also intended for the Easter market.

THE MAUSER BULLET.

"It is some comfort to the bereaved to learn that the wounds, even to the death, caused by the Mauser bullet are almost painless."

"The missiles pierced through flesh and bone as if they had been tissue paper. He felt only a sensation of numbness in the arm. He went down, picked up his rifle, and fired several rounds before he collapsed from loss of blood."

"Of the 123 wounded at Glencoe and Etanisaige only three had to be carried off in cots, after reaching Cape Town; all the rest wounded in head, arms or body walked to the train."

"The wound it makes is so tiny that a lead pencil could be used as a probe."

"I felt a blow in my back; neither violent nor painful. I fell down . . . to my surprise I could not get up. The surgeon told me I had only a few minutes to live . . . his statements produced as little effect on me mentally as did the Mauser bullet physically."

"He leaned over and asked me how I felt. I could not answer him till I had finished, in my mind, one phrase of "Rock of Ages."
