

Eighth Flight Of Ice Patrol Made Yesterday

The eighth flight of the ice patrol which took place yesterday showed indications of a decided improvement in Northumberland Strait, but Cabot Strait showing more ice than earlier observations. There is still, however, a good track between St. Paul's Island and Newfoundland.

Nine hundred miles were covered which took the observer to the mouth of the St. Lawrence river where the plane turned back owing to diminishing visibility. The plane took off from Charlottetown at 9:20 a.m. and returned at 3:05 p.m.

The route followed was North East from Charlottetown to the North side then across to St. Paul's Island, C. B. Three searers were observed working north of St. Paul's. The steamer track was then followed to the mouth of the St. Lawrence. On the return run it was observed that a twenty mile wide clear water area extends along the entire north side of the Island with heavy ice beyond that distance to the Magdalen and St. Paul's Island.

A heavy field from West Point to 20 miles off North Point, P. E. I. with heavy drift ice all along the Island coast to Cape Bear, with the Nova Scotia coast clear, was also observed.

Capt. Brown, ice observer for the Department of Transport commenting on the flight said that something new was witnessed as they passed near the south coast of Anticosti Island when several large herds of deer were seen coming out of the dense snow and foraging for food, probably kept along the rocky shore.

Capt. Charles Trainor was in charge of the flight with Elmer Bulmer navigating officer.

Liberal Candidates For Fifth Queens Nominated

Hon. B. Earle MacDonald and Mr. Alex A. MacIsaac were the unanimous choice of a largely attended Liberal convention called last night at the Community Centre to nominate two candidates for the Fifth District of Queens in the forthcoming election. Mr. MacDonald at present is Minister of Health and Welfare and has been sitting member for the Charlottetown district during the past four years.

Mr. MacIsaac was born in Inverness, Cape Breton, 48 years ago. He received his early education in Nova Scotia and later moved to the United States, where he attended trade and vocational school. He settled in Prince Edward Island 13 years ago and at present is the owner of the Island Tobacco Company. A member of the Gyo Club and the Knights of Columbus, he has served for the past ten years on the board of governors for the Charlottetown Hospital. He is now serving his second term as president of the Fifth District Liberal Association.

Mr. MacDonald's nomination was moved by Elmer MacRae and seconded by Frank Hughes. Mr. MacDonald's nomination was moved by W. R. Jenkins and seconded by Pictou McCormac. Mr. Lester O'Donnell strongly supported Mr. MacDonald's nomination. Both candidates addressed the meeting briefly and expressed their thanks.

Quebec Province

Lothbiniere, 30 miles from Quebec to get on strict rations. Mayor Paul Biron said Monday the village has been cut off from the railway station at Laurier, nine miles south since last Monday. There was a shortage of food and fuel and no immediate means of clearing the highway to the station.

"We haven't received flour since last Monday and our bread supply can hold out for only about three more days and the mayor said in a telephone interview.

The town's two doctors made calls on skis and snowshoes but "if we meet a serious case that requires hospital treatment, we'll be in a terrible fix." The nearest hospital is at Levis, 25 miles east.

TRAIN STUCK
A Quebec Central Railways train carrying 150 passengers was stuck in 20-foot drifts all Sunday night and Monday near St. Lambert, 20 miles south of Quebec.

Snowmobiles shuttled between St. Lambert and the train, bringing food to the passengers and carrying some 50 men with shovels to the scene.

A rescue train itself became lodged in the snow, after which two others were directed to the relief job from Vallee Junction, south of St. Lambert, and Levis.

Emile Martin, 46, of Thetford Mines, Que., one of the passengers brought to town in a snowmobile, said in a telephone interview the stranded passengers took things calmly. Some slept through the night while others played cards and sang.

The train was heated and had enough coal for another 24 hours. In Montreal, 16 persons were injured, none seriously, Monday when a streetcar was forced off the rails by packed snow and struck a telegraph pole.
