

### C.A.H.A. Puts New Teeth In Rule Book At Meeting

HALIFAX, May 24 — (CP) — The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association today put a sting in its rule book for players or team officials delaying games.

The rule provides a one-year suspension — with no right of appeal — for a player or official who withdraws a team from the ice, fails to ice a team or refuses to start play within two minutes after being ordered to do so by the referee.

If a team is withdrawn, refuses to ice a team or holds up a game a second time, the two-minute warning will not be given and the same penalties apply. In each case, the game will be awarded to the opposing team.

The original motion provided for a two-year suspension but this was amended after several delegates said this long suspension might harm younger players by depriving them of coaching for a lengthy period.

The Association, holding its third session of the 38th annual convention, threw out an amendment which would allow clubs to affiliate others within a radius of 50 miles.

George Panter of the Ontario Hockey Association asked for reconsideration, saying that a junior "A" team could not afford to sponsor a junior "B" club in the same centre. But they needed reserves and could get them by affiliating with a club some distance away.

Bert Johnson of Thunder Bay said the amendment would only make the two strong branches—Ontario and Quebec—stronger and would not help clubs in the west.

Under a new agreement, reinstated professionals will not be allowed to sign cards with other than major or senior clubs if they have been re-instated after Jan. 1 of the playing season.

Secretary-manager George Dudley presented a new financial proposal, which calls for an annual budget with the deficit to be met from a proportionate amount from the three playoff series.

His proposal, held over for consideration later, suggested a \$78,700 budget for next season—with \$74,475 remaining to be raised from the three playoffs.

Under the present system, the C. A. H. A. gets 15 per cent of the gross gate of the series, pays expenses of officials and runs its business on the remainder.

Requests from the British Columbia and Maritime branches for additional imports was deferred until the major series receives further consideration.

The Association decided also to make efforts to have hockey listed as Canada's national game, instead of lacrosse as at present. Albie Coe of Winnipeg cast the only dissenting vote.

### O'Brien Second In Two Races At Toledo, Ohio

TOLEDO, O., May 24 — (AP) — Alama B. took two straight heats last night to win the 28-class trot in the Grand Circuit harness races at Fort Miami Raceway. The purse was \$1,000.

Owned by A.C. Beardslee of Arcade, N.Y., Alama B. finished the third race in 2:08.1, paying \$4.80, \$3.20 and \$2.80, and paced the fourth in 2:06 at \$4.00, \$2.80 and \$2.40.

Mighty Song of Castleton Farm, Lexington, Ky., won the 20 class trot, which had a \$1,500 purse. He did the fifth heat in 2:07, paying \$3.00, \$2.80 and \$2.60. He got off to a bad start in the eighth, but won by three lengths in 2:07.1 at \$2.60, \$3.00 and \$2.80.

Driver Joe O'Brien, who hails from Alberton, P.E.I., and New Glasgow, N.S., finished second driving Fan Dancer in the fourth race and in the same spot in the fifth race with Emilie D.

### Ike Williams 3-1 Favorite In Fight Tonight

NEW YORK, May 24 — (AP) — Although lightweight champion Ike Williams is going to have a tight squeeze making the 135-pound limit, the Trenton, N.J. Negro ruled a big 3 to 1 favorite to defeat Jimmy Carter of the Bronx in their 15-round title bout in Madison Square Garden tomorrow night.

The 27-year-old champion, making his first title defence in 17 months, started drying out today. He won't take any liquids until after he weighs in at noon tomorrow. He weighed 135½ today and expects to hit 135.

If he doesn't make it at noon, he'll have until 1:30 to shed the surplus. If he can't make it, he'll forfeit his crown. The fight, then will become a non-title affair and Carter will be recognized as the No. 1 challenger in New York.

CHICAGO, May 24 — (AP) — The biggest daily double return of the Chicago season, \$1,541.60, was posted during the Lincoln Fields program at Washington Park today. Twenty-five \$2 tickets were sold on Moon Baby, \$18.60 winner of the opener, and Dick Hay Day, \$97.80 victor in the second race.

### Sport Echoes From Prince County

They also held a banquet celebrating the winning of the crown. We don't know why this should be, but it certainly emphasizes the need for a central Maritime body for baseball. If there was anything wrong with Summerside's winning of this title, the matter should have been investigated and cleared up one way or the other. But to ignore the series played in Summerside and present the St. John's team with the Maritime trophy without even notifying the Summerside team that such action was to be taken was high-handed in the extreme. 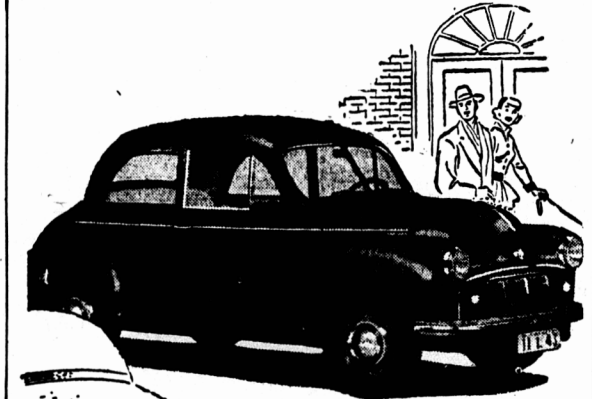
