WHAT WE HAVE WE'LL HOLD.—The Rev. Benj. Chappell, of Tokyo, Japan, referring to the design on a private postal card received from Charlottetown a few weeks ago, says: "The picture, 'What We Have, We'll Hold' interested men as putting in brutal frankness how far the national spirit has departed from the spirit of him who spoke the sermon on the Mount. Right at our doors, not the barbarity of the heathen Chinese, but the barefaced greed and overmastering imperiousness of the strong against the weak, the wrong of Christian nations, so-called, has brought about what is taking place."

THE NEW GEOGRAPHY.—We have been shown a copy of the new Canadian School Geography, published by W. J. Gage & Co. of Toronto. It is especially commendable by reason of the excellent map studies which are very easily comprehended, and also because the beginning of the study is made very simple, the difficulties being overcome by gradual development in instruction, a feature not so strong in many other geographies. It is unquestionably a good book, and is highly commended by educators.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says: A heavy lightning storm passed over Cape Traverse and vicinity Saturday afternoon. At Augustine Cove, two horses owned by Mr. William Crockett, of Cape Traverse, were killed while standing in Mr. Harry Clark's blacksmith shop. Mr. Crockett and Mr. Clark had a few minutes previously gone into the latter's house to tea, and when they returned to the shop they found the two horses dead. The lightning had entered by the door which was open and passed through the opposite wall. The building was but slightly damaged. Mr. Crockett's loss is a heavy one, the horses being valuable ones.
