Borden Short 30 On Objective

Approximately 70 donors reported at the first of a series of Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics held in Borden School last night, which was just 30 short of the town's objective of 100 donors. The Clinic was arranged by the Borden Women's Institute, the members of which solicited the donors and were on hand to help the Mobile Team from Halifax, with the many jobs to be done at a Clinic of this kind. These ladies also provided delicious refreshments for the donors.

There were donors from the following districts in addition to those from Borden itself: Bedouque, Albany, Carleton, Sidings, Cape Traverse, Summerside, Peake's Station, Portage, Tryon, Charlottetown, and Carleton. Five Murray brothers from Bedouque composed one of the carloads of donors who arrived at the Clinic. One of these men was a donor at Borden's first Clinic a year ago and this time came back with four of his brothers. If all donors followed the example set by Mr. Murray, Prince Edward Island would have no difficulty in securing its objective of 1700 donors for this Clinic.

It is hoped that the deficit of 30 donors at Borden last night will be made up at the Clinics to be held today at O'Leary this afternoon and at Alberton tonight and during the following days at the different centres to be visited.

The only rink of any kind that will be available for skating and hockey for children and adults will be the outdoor rink operated and maintained by the Kinsmen Club.
