

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

NEW YORK, June 20.

Last evening the steamer "Grand Republic," that runs to Rockway, collided with the steamer "Adelaide," which plies between this city and Long Branch. The latter sank. The "Grand Republic" had just landed at Fulton Ferry Beecher's Sunday School, which had been on an excursion. The "Grand Republic" was uninjured. The "Adelaide" formerly ran between Boston and St. John, N. B.

William S. Young, master of the steamboat "Narragansett," this evening attended Trinity Episcopal Church in Jersey City, of which Rev. R. Hare is pastor. During the sermon the minister denounced all officers of the "Narragansett" as cowards. Captain Young, who sat in front of the pulpit, arose and said, "Any one who made such a charge was a liar." He was conducted to the police station by one of the trustees, charged with bad conduct and locked up to answer.

CINCINNATI, June 19.

A railroad accident occurred on Friday at the bridge over the Sciota River, near Chillicothe, on the Dayton and Southeastern Railroad. James Duffy, bridge watchman, went to sleep with one arm over the rail. A gravel train backed down upon him and the entire train was thrown off. Five men were thrown into the river and twenty others into the debris of the wrecked train. John Kennedy was drowned; Martin Coyle, Marias Miller and James Duffy were fatally injured. Others escaped with slight injuries.

NEW YORK, June 19.

A Cincinnati despatch to the "Star" says a letter in the hands of Gov. Robinson from Tilden, declining to be Presidential candidate, is to be read at the Democratic Convention.

The Tammany delegates and friends, to the number of 500, left for Cincinnati this morning over the New York Central. Fifteen drawing room cars, decorated with flags and mottoes, made up their special train. A band of music accompanied the delegation. Large crowds witnessed their departure.

PLAINFIELD, N. J., June 19.

The colored Republicans hold a State Convention in Trenton July 15th, to consider questions affecting their rights and to demand of candidates pledges to protect their rights under the Constitution.

COLUMBUS, O., June 20.

President Hayes and wife spent the day very quietly, attending church at Broad street chapel. Referring to his contemplated trip to California, the President said his idea being to reach Sacramento in time to attend the state fair, he will extend his trip to Oregon and possibly go farther north.

CINCINNATI O., June 20.

This was a beautiful day, not too warm for comfort, and the delegates and visitors not immediately engaged in business of Convention have visited the attractive suburbs and swarmed on all the hill-top resorts. Last night a most delightful reception was given the Ohio delegation by the residents of Clifton; speeches were made by Theodore Cook, Gen. H. Pendleton, W. S. Grosbeck, John McSweeney, John W. Stevenson and Richard Smith. To-day the Ohio delegation had two meetings, at both of which there was great enthusiasm for Thurman, and it was resolved to stand firm. It was stated that Jewell's candidacy was not to be considered, so long as Thurman was in the field. Much bitterness was expressed towards the supporters of Payne. It was decided that W. D. Hill should make the nominating speech and that John McSweeney should second the nomination. To-night the New York delegation held a meeting at the Grand Hotel and organized by choosing Daniel Manning chairman, and S. B. Halliday, secretary. Mr. Peckham read a letter from Samuel J. Tilden, declining the honor of nomination to the Presidency.

## CONDENSED DESPACHES.

Gen. John A. Salter, the man who first discovered gold in California, died at Washington on Friday last.

The business part of Starkville, Miss., was burned on Friday, including Court House and Odd Fellows Hall. Loss \$100,000; insurance, \$300,000.

The steamer with the Burmese Ambassador has reached Mandalay with the Governor of Sillio-Mayo aboard in irons. The Governor is imprisoned awaiting trial for detaining a British steamer.

The Home Rulers will oppose the progress of the Bill for the relief of the Irish distress until the Government introduces a bill founded on the principle of the new clause, to be proposed in the relief of the distress bill by Wm. E. Foster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, enlarging the powers of the local boards for awarding compensation to occupiers of land. The object of the Irish members is to have the two bills advance side by side.

The wreck of the Stonington steamer "Narragansett" was sold at auction Saturday by order of the U. S. District Court. The amount realized for the boat with engines, tackle, furniture, etc., just as she lies off Cornfield Point, was \$10,000, the purchaser being C. P. Dixon.

News comes to Paris from Rio that a secret treaty, offensive and defensive, has been concluded between Costa Rica and Peru, the provisions of which refer to the transportation of munitions of war across the Isthmus of Panama.

The Times says it is reported that the Province of Buenos Ayres has seceded from the Argentine Confederation, but the source of the report is not ascertained.

Much satisfaction is expressed at Rome, at the complete accord between Italy and England, with regard to the questions before the Berlin Conference. All the English propositions to Italy and such propositions as Italy has sent, have been equally acceptable to England.

THE VERY REV. PRINCIPAL CAIRNS.—Charlottetown is to be favored with an address from this eminent divine and philosopher. The pastor of St. James' Kirk, the Rev. K. MacLennan, whilst at Montreal attending the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, induced Principal Cairns to make a flying visit to this city, and consequently our fellow townsmen will have the pleasure of listening to one of the profoundest thinkers connected with evangelical religion in Scotland. Dr. Cairns takes a foremost place in metaphysics. He was a disciple of Sir Wm. Hamilton and the man whom he wished to succeed him as professor of metaphysics and other recondite subjects. We advise our readers to avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing Dr. Cairns on Wednesday night, at the Kirk. We understand the officers of the church are making every arrangement to accommodate a large audience. We subjoin a brief description of Dr. Cairns from the Halifax Herald: Dr. Cairns is a tall, stoop-shouldered, white-bearded and white-haired patriarch. He speaks with a strong Scotch accent. His face beams with health and geniality. He uses no notes in preaching, and is animated and eloquent in his delivery. I listened to him in Crescent Street Church last evening, when he preached to a vast audience, which hung in rapt attention on his words crowded the building to suffocation. The discourse was remarkable for the vigor of its delivery, for the simplicity of its division and illustration, and at times, for the eloquence of its utterances. I heard him long ago, ere his hair was tinged with white, and think that as he speaks now, mellowed by grace and time, he is emphatically even more than he was then the Nestor of Scotland.
