for office—stated that there were two things they wanted to get power in Canada for; one was to make cheaper for the farmers of this country kerosene oil, and the other to make a reduction on binder twine. A voice.—And whiskey.

And you know the result of their bungling with regard to these two articles. Under their policy everything was left in a mess, and Sir Charles Tupper, who has a reputation on two continents, is the only man able to take up the task of straightening out and placing things as they ought to be placed. Then Canadians will have the pride and satisfaction of knowing that they have a government to rule over them which is capable of conducting their affairs not only economically but satisfactorily to all classes of the people. But we will not only have Sir Charles Tupper, we will also have our soldiers with us. The Hon. Mr. Foster in his eloquent peroration spoke about the duties and sacrifices of our boys in going to the rescue of those in South Africa. But what has been the conduct of the Canadian Government with regard to these boys, some of whom have been maimed perhaps for life, and many of whom will carry with them the wounds and scars inflicted upon them in defence of the flag in South Africa. Why, we have in the public journals of this country that on their arrival at the city of Quebec the Government of Canada, which has been so much under the management of Tarte, Blair and Sifton, which has spent millions of money building public works that are useless, took these soldier boys and gave them second-class tickets over the Government railways and Canadian Pacific Railway to the cities of Vancouver and Victoria, and the munificent sum of \$3 with which to pay their fare to their homes on a journey occupying five or six days. This is the way that these boys, these sons of Canada, were treated by the paternal Government of this country—a Government which by corruption booting and other means, by rolling up taxes and spending millions, are endeavoring to fortify and keep themselves in power. Gentlemen, a wave of patriotism swept over the country last autumn when a section of the Government of Canada attempted to prevent our boys from going to the rescue of the soldiers of the flag in South Africa, and that wave spread all over Canada. "Nothing is too good for our soldiers," was the feeling everywhere. But now when the excitement has passed, when the enemies of the country in South Africa are overcome and tottering to a fall, I ask you not to allow your patriotism to die out of your heart; but in the coming elections call the Government of Canada to strict account for the mean and dastardly way in which they treated the boys returning to their homes, by giving them a starvation and begrudging allowance to carry them to their destinations. That is not the way to treat

men making sacrifices for their country and pouring out their life's blood in defence not of their own liberty but of the liberties of their brethren 7,000 miles away. We can afford to treat them generously. We have in Charlottetown now a young man who came home the other day from the war with his left arm paralyzed by his side. That young man of magnificent parts left this country with sound body and sound mind, and able to make a good living for himself anywhere. He returns home disabled. Are you going to permit this government which is squandering your money as a Government in Canada never squandered it before, to allow these young boys many of them in humble station, and broken in body and spirits to be left desolate without visiting on the government which has done these things your righteous and just indignation? I shall say nothing more about that. You are to be congratulated upon the order and attention given to these distinguished statesmen, and in your name and in the name of the people of Prince Edward Island, I heartily thank them for the sacrifice (as I said before) which they have made in coming to our assistance and laying bare and exposing the misdeeds of the Government of Canada these four and a half years. (Applause)

Alexander Mart'n, Esq., M. P., on being called for aid: I am sure it would be very cruel to detain you at this late hour, after you have heard the eloquent addresses of our chief, Sir Charles Tupper and the Hon. George E. Foster. I shall say but a very few words. I am sure the gentleman who has been selected as the standard bearer for West Queen's will give such an account of himself as will ensure his election. I feel that Prince Edward Island will be the banner Province of the Dominion, and there is no reason why it should not be. Charlottetown is a Conservative city, and I feel that on election day it will be found to be the fore also. Gentlemen, I thank you. (Applause)
