## Souris Line Club Said Great Step Forward

"One of the greatest steps forward in the rural youth movement in Prince Edward Island," Hon. Walter R. Shaw, premier and minister of agriculture, recently said of the newly-formed 4-H Forestry Club, the first in the province, at Souris Line Road.

Tremendously pleased and encouraged by the enthusiasm of the club members, Frank Gaudet, chief forester, termed the new club "a very keen, well-manned group which is really trying to absorb every bit of information."

He said the forestry division is endeavouring through this program to interest the public not only in woodlot management but also in planting, fire protection, wood and tree identification, and all allied matters.

them, still too young to belong to the club, are regularly attending the club sessions and paying intelligent attention to the work done.

Much of the credit for the success of the new club is given by Mr. Gaudet to Rev. J. E. Cash, neighborhood priest, who has given tremendous impetus to the work by his own keenness.

"A great deal could be accomplished in other parts of the province as well if more people like Father Cash would direct the youngsters," the forester said.

Mr. Gaudet added that the forestry division will give its

fullest co-operation to other groups anxious to start in the work. All they need he said is a strong conscientious director to spark the movement.

### WOODLOT MANAGEMENT

The Souris group at present is dealing with woodlot management in all its phases. At its most recent meeting the group heard Mr. Gaudet outline the most important items for consideration. They included full use of the land, proper spacing between trees, necessity for fast growth through good health and care, production of good quality through valuable trees of good size and shape and adequate restocking.

He concluded his talk by telling the boys and girls that being in good woodlot management "can you eat your cake and have it too". His explanation was that with proper care mature trees can be cut year after year while fast growing young and middle-age trees remain to provide a sustained yield.

### FOUND INVESTMENT

Mr. Gaudet looks on the proper handling of woodlots, as do all other keen agricultural authorities, as a sound investment for the farmer. One which returns an annual cash income of no small importance to all rural residents.

The club holds meetings once each month with the chief forester attending the gatherings in Souris Line Road School. They are conducted along the lines of classroom technique with definite lessons followed by questions dealing with the subjects discussed and on 'homework' of the students.

At the end of the school session films dealing with forestry and allied subjects are shown to maintain the interest of the members.
