

New Yorker Gets DFC 11 Years After RCAF Exploits

NEW YORK (CP)—A 34-year-old New York salesman, Christian Marius Nielsen, Thursday finally got the distinguished flying cross he won 11 years ago with the RCAF during the Second World War.

Nielsen, a pilot officer, was awarded the DFC March 20, 1944 for his "many successful operations against the enemy in the course of which he has invariably displayed high skill, fortitude and devotion to duty."

The medal wasn't presented to him personally, however, for the following day he took off on his 26th combat mission in an 800-plane raid over Nuernberg and his Halifax bomber was one of 94 Allied planes that didn't return.

Fellow pilots saw the plane straighten out for its bombing run and then explode as flames suddenly spurted from the inner starboard engine.

NOT ACCOUNTED FOR

Although RCAF officials learned that Nielsen and two other crew members parachuted to safety, he was not accounted for when the prisoner-of-war camps opened after the war. Nielsen apparently went directly home from Germany after being released from the POW camp and didn't bother reporting his whereabouts to RCAF officials.

Judgment In Supreme Court

Justice George J. Tweedy, presiding at the Kings County Assizes yesterday, brought down judgment in the case of John E. Murphy, who appealed a conviction and sentence of 14 days in magistrate's court on the charge of having the care and control of a vehicle while intoxicated. Justice Tweedy pointed out that Mr. Murphy had entered a plea of guilty in the lower court and no evidence was presented, so that the presiding magistrate could not do anything but give the sentence according to law. However, he said, in view of the evidence presented at this hearing, he was without doubt that Murphy had no intention of taking the care and control of the vehicle. He therefore allowed the appeal and set aside the conviction. However, in view of the fact that the appellant had entered a plea of guilty in the lower court and had not presented proper evidence, Justice Tweedy said that the appellant should not go unpunished, and would therefore be required to pay crown counsel fees to the extent of \$20.

In the civil case of Edward Laybitt, plaintiff vs Johnston Motors, defendant, in a case of damages, involved from the sale of the defendant, but disallowed any counter claim.

The case of Lester Brehaut Lecco, Point Pleasant, appealing a fine of \$100 and conviction in the magistrate's court for possession of a still suitable for the manufacture of illicit spirits, was heard yesterday afternoon. Mr. S. S. Hession, O.C., represented the crown and evidence was given by Cpl. Don Davis and Const. Ron Pettit of the Montague Detachment R.C.M.P. Mr. Allison Gillis represented the appellant, and evidence was given by Lester Lecco, Lloyd Higginbotham, Clark Horton, George MacKinnon, Mrs. George MacKinnon, and the evidence of John Irving given in the lower court was read in as evidence with permission of crown counsel.

Aussie Newsmen Sent To Prison

LONDON (Reuters)—Two Australian newspaper men sentenced to prison terms by the Australian Federal Parliament last month failed Thursday in a bid to have the conviction reversed by the judicial committee of the privy council.

Magic RAISIN SCONES

Mix and sift into bowl, 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/4 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 3 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt. Cut in finely 4 tbs. chilled shortening and mix in 1/4 c. washed and dried raisins and 1/4 c. lightly-packed brown sugar. Combine 1 and 2 and mix thoroughly. Add slightly-beaten egg, 2 tbs. milk and a few drops almond flavoring. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly with fork, adding milk if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead for 10 seconds on a lightly-floured board and pat out into greased pie plate (7 1/2" top inside measure) and mark into 6 pie-shaped wedges. Bake in hot oven, 425°, about 18 minutes. Serve hot with butter or margarine. Yield—6 scones.

Insurance Co's Put More Money In Mortgages

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian life insurance companies increased their investment in Canadian real estate mortgages by about a third in the first five months of this year compared with the corresponding period last year.

Companies representing some 80 per cent of life insurance premium income in Canada report total investment in mortgages in the period at \$16,000,000, up 34 per cent. After deducting repayments on mortgages, net increase in mortgage holdings was \$2,000,000 bringing the total to \$1,457,000,000.

Results of the survey were announced by the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association. Total increase in Canadian investments by the companies surveyed was \$136,000,000 in the five months. Of this, \$127,000,000 arose from Canadian insurance operations and \$9,000,000 was in funds transferred from abroad.

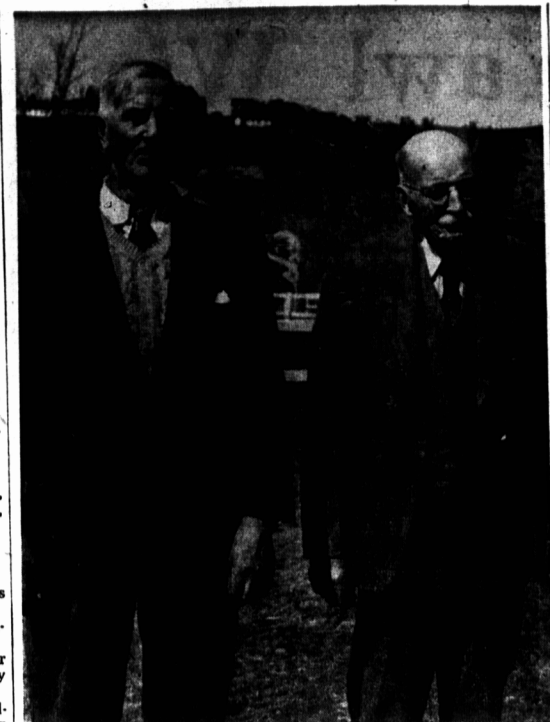
The companies increased holdings of provincial bonds by \$8,000,000 to \$275,000,000 of municipal bonds by 5,000,000 to 256,000,000; and of corporate securities by \$25,000 to \$1,288,000,000.

Will Sign Air Routes Agreement

BOON, Germany (AP)—West Germany and Britain will sign an international air routes agreement in London next week, Transport Minister Hans-Christoph Seebohn announced in the Bundestag Thursday.

Negotiations with France are also nearing conclusion, he said. The agreements will be similar to that recently signed between the United States and West Germany.

Authoritative sources said the pact with Britain will allow the German Lufthansa Airline to fly to London, Manchester, Glasgow and Edinburgh. Services through Manchester to Dublin, Ireland, Canada and the United States also will be permitted.



Sees 67-Year Life Cycle End

Mr. MacKinnon, who died Wednesday night was the first baby that Dr. MacKinnon delivered when he started his practice 67 years ago. He was pronounced dead by the 97-year-old doctor following a sudden heart attack.

It was in 1888, shortly after Dr. R. J. (Roddy) MacDonald opened his practice in St. Peter's.
