"An adventure in Citizenship" brings together each year a representative body of Canadian students who are looked after by the Rotary Club of Ottawa and given an opportunity to visit points of interest on conducted tours, be entertained by Federal members of parliament at various functions, attend lectures dealing with Canadian citizenship, and exchange views with each other on home town and provincial matters. Rotarians R. C. Parent and Alfred Pickard composed the committee which designated Frederick as qualified in every way to fulfill the requirements of a representative as laid down by the Ottawa club.

Transport For The Injured

If you ever have to look after an injured person you may have to carry him to a doctor—or out of harm's way. And that's not so easy unless you know how. It's all the harder if the injured party must avoid movement.

St. John Ambulance has some useful suggestions for you when you're in a spot like this. For a person with a broken bone, or someone too ill to walk, a stretcher is the answer. If there isn't a stretcher handy—and most likely there won't be—you can easily improvise one. St. John Ambulance recommends any of the following methods. Use two coats, jackets or wind-breakers. Turn the sleeves outside in and place the coats with their lower ends touching each other. Put a pole through the sleeves on each side, then button the coats up with the button sides downward. A heavy overcoat may be used in place of the two coats. Place two poles along the edges of the rug over the poles until they are 20 inches apart. Open a blanket on the ground. Place two poles on the blanket, each of them 10 inches from the centre. Fold the ends of the blanket, one at a time, over the poles to the opposite pole and a stretcher with three poles is formed. A gate or door may be used if any of these methods are not possible. If using any of these ideas be sure you test the improvised stretcher before you use it. A fall can cause untold complications to an injured person.

Police Committee Report To Council

"During the month of March, conditions have been quiet in the City. One woman was attacked on the street and lost her purse. There is no information to date as to the offender," stated Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur in his report to the City Council at the regular monthly meeting Monday night. The report read, by councillor Arthur Gormley, chairman of the Police Committee, shows that out of Police arrests made during the month, there were 59 convictions. Thirty-five were convicted on a charge of being drunk and incapable. Fourteen vagrancy cases resulted in 13 convictions and one dismissal. There were two cases of breaking, entering and theft, both of which were sent to the Supreme Court. Three motorists were convicted of drunken driving and paid fines of \$200 each and two parties were fined under the Temperance Act, one for illegal consumption and the other for illegal possession of liquor. Parking meter permits issued during the month at \$5.00 each were 28. Meter rentals at taxi and repair stands amounted to \$27.50. The Police Department issued 17 burial certificates during the past 30 days.

Clearing Out Gov't Pond

A group of city employees have been assigned the difficult task of clearing off the high spots in Government pond, which when filled with fresh water should present a better appearance. Several men from the scoop brigade and wade out to location to place the same in position. A steel hauler is attached to the scoop and towing is then done by a couple of pay-loaders on high land ashore. The mud removed from the pond is being utilized as fill at low places in Victoria Park.

MEMORY OF GREAT P. E. ISLAND ARTIST HONOURED LAST EVENING

Now showing at the Harris Memorial Gallery is a collection of the paintings of Robert Harris, C.M.G., R.C.A., which undoubtedly represents the most outstanding display ever shown in Prince Edward Island and probably one of the finest collections in Canada. In addition to the permanent paintings of the gallery are nearly 30 other Harris paintings from private owners. Contributors to this special display are Mr. James E. Harris, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Cotter, Mrs. George D. DeBlou, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Mrs. R. L. Mutch, Mrs. R. E. Mutch, Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Palmer, Miss Margaret Cotton, Mrs. T. E. MacNutt, Mr. R. E. Hyndman. The exhibition will be open for three afternoons, today, tomorrow and Friday. A feature of the opening of the display last evening was an address on the life of Mr. Harris by Mr. R. H. Rogers, M.A., introduced by the Art Society president Vic Runtz. Mr. Rogers gave many interesting details of the artist's career. The speaker was thanked by past-president Mrs. P. A. Creelman. In the course of his address Mr. Rogers said: "What kind of a man was Robert Harris? I have already indicated what he was like in his youth. His nephews remember him as a lover of children. Though he never had any of his own he delighted in entertaining and playing with those of his relatives and friends. He was always a modest person, sometimes considered shy; and he certainly was exceedingly industrious, for his artistic output was prodigious. His range of interests was wide and varied, but his greatest pleasure was not narrow, for he was widely read, especially in literature and history, and music was one of his greatest pleasures."

Most of the paintings on display at the gallery are oil portraits for which Mr. Harris is known throughout Canadian art circles. Amongst these is an outstanding self-portrait painted in many subdued colors. The skillful strokes used for flesh and hair tones have created a memorable painting. Other portraits showing include those of Mrs. MacNutt, a cavalier (for which the artist was awarded a gold medal at the Paris exhibition), a woman painted in Paris, his parents, and his nephew (Mr. James Harris). Always delightful to study is the study of a country school, showing the black stove, the tall school master and the classroom of bare-foot youngsters. Thrilling, too, is the "story" behind the final painting of what became a national painting—that of the Fathers of Confederation. On one wall, hang four preliminary studies and one charcoal drawing of the historical picture which is also reproduced. Mr. Harris was commissioned by the Canadian Government in 1883 to capture the event when 34 statesmen gathered and made history. It would be worthwhile for every Canadian student to visit the Harris gallery and view this work of art.

The collection is a credit to the Art Society of P.E.I. in recognizing the genius of this artist, who has kept alive this country's distinguished people and its history, and has made an effort to bring his work together for the public.

Hard of Hearing" Meeting Held

A representative meeting of the hard of hearing of the City was held in the ladies' parlor, Canadian Legion on Monday evening. The objective of the meeting may be summed up as follows: To bring together these persons who are incapacitated by their loss of hearing and to form an organization; to try to help people accept disability of hearing loss; To perhaps form a group interested in lip reading; To educate the public towards better understanding of the needs of the deaf and hard of hearing; To work towards half of the interests of the hard of hearing and deaf; To enjoy social get-togethers.

During the discussion, which was informal and preliminary, it was pointed out Prince Edward Island was the only Province in which there was no organization devoted to the interests of this class of social impairment. There is no physical defect more easily adjusted, so as to bring the affected back into a greater measure of usefulness. Actual organization was not undertaken, but deferred to a later meeting which will be held following the Easter holidays. In the meantime a committee will be actively engaged in further planning for action at a meeting that will be announced and open to everybody interested within range of attendance — City and country.

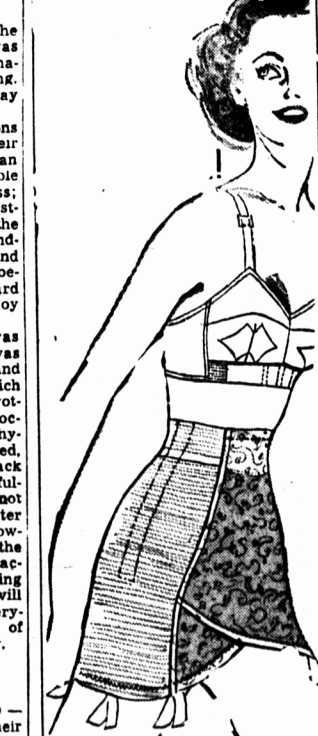
