ARCHBISHOP RYAN the distinguished Catholic prelate of Philadelphia, will arrive in Halifax in about two weeks' time, on his way to St. John's, Nfld. He will be in Halifax for some days.

At the meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association to-day at Kensington the score at the 200 yards range stood: P. E. Island, 231; Nova Scotia, 229; New Brunswick, 229. Strong wind blowing.

THE MERRIMACK.

Arrival of Passengers.

Alleged Rascally Conduct of Crew.

JUDGE ALLEY LAYS DOWN THE LAW.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 13. The steamer City of St. John arrived at 10 o'clock yesterday morning with fifty-eight passengers, mostly women, from the wrecked steamer Merrimack, who were brought from Liverpool. The rest, about thirty men, arrived at Liverpool yesterday, and will be brought to Halifax by the tug A. C. Whitney.

The story that Pilot Reynolds, of the Merrimack had stated that the steamer's compass was out of order is confirmed.

The conduct of the crew and some of the officers after the men landed on the Island is described as disgraceful and outrageous. They obtained large quantities of liquor and became very drunk in which condition they created a perfect uproar.

On Monday, it is alleged, the quartermaster went off to the steamer and returned with a boat load of baggage, for which he demanded that the passengers should pay twenty-five dollars. Judge Alley, a passenger, declared that he objected to the payment of the money, and told the quartermaster that he dare not take it. The man frightened at the tone of Judge Alley handed over the baggage without insisting on being paid. One trunk landed had been cleaned out completely of its contents. Supposed to have been done by plunderers.

The Merrimack was insured principally in English offices for nearly her entire value.

The Sultan Persists.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 13. The Sultan persists in his refusal to sign the convention with England with reference to Egypt in its present form, notwithstanding it is urgently advised to ratify it by both Germany and Italy.

Stabbing Affray.

WASHINGTON, July 13. Joseph C. Kennedy, aged 78, a prominent citizen, was stabbed to death on the streets this evening by John Daily, a laborer, who claimed that Kennedy wronged his father in a business transaction years ago. Kennedy was a friend of all the great statesmen of the ante-war period. The excitement over his death is greater than at any time since the assassination of President Garfield.

The Crown Prince.

LONDON, July 13. The Crown Prince and Princess of Germany have arrived at the Isle of Wight in their yacht. While the yacht was proceeding from Portsmouth with their Imperial Highnesses on board it collided with the British troopship Orontes, and both were much damaged.

The Queen and the Premier.

LONDON, July 13. The Queen to-day attended a garden party at Hatfield House, the residence of Lord Salisbury, in Hertfordshire. The town of Hatfield was en fete in honor of Her Majesty's presence. The day was warm and pleasant.

A Canadian Cyclone.

QUEBEC, July 13. A cyclone passed over this district to-night, uprooting trees, levelling chimneys and unroofing frail structures. Marine disasters are feared.

Great Distress.

QUEBEC, July 13. Icelandic immigrants, who have arrived at Quebec, report great distress in Iceland, a great portion of the population being in a starving condition.

A Light Punishment.

LONDON, July 13. Lieut. Young, of the Surrey Regiment, has been sentenced to eight months' imprisonment for abducting a 17 year old girl.

Canadian Affairs.

L'Abbe Casgrain of Quebec a well known French Canadian writer on historical subjects, has been spending some days in the French Acadian settlements of Yarmouth county, and will make a tour of the French Districts of Nova Scotia, to gather material for the closing chapters of his work on the Acadians. His principal object is to secure evidence from traditions and documents to refute Parkman's strictures on the Acadians' loyalty during the period preceding their dispersion. He has made several trips to Europe to search the archives at Paris, London and Rome, and will make another trip this fall for the same object. His coming volume will be published at Paris in November, and will treat of the Acadians from their dispersion to the present day, being a supplement to a previous work on the period before the expulsion. L'Abbe Casgrain is also the author of several other historical and biographical works. He is a member of the Historical Society of Boston, the Geographical Society of Paris, the Royal Society of Canada, and other similar bodies.

Within the past fortnight Messrs. Bell & Co., of Guelph, have despatched to England and Australia upwards of 120 organs. In a day or so they will send forward a consignment to Japan.

Mr. Mercier is in luck by the Privy Council having sustained the act of the previous Tory government imposing special taxes on banks, insurance companies and other financial corporations. The new taxes will add largely to the revenue of the province, if they are enforced as by law required. They have hitherto been held in abeyance by appeals from court to court.

The Canadian Pacific has brought itself into sudden conspicuousness as one of the chief routes of the globe by its transportation of a cargo of Japan tea. The tea has arrived in London on the thirty-first day after leaving Yokohama, having traversed 220 degrees of longitude. No previous shipment over any other route has approached this despatch. At this rate, when the Russian railroad in Central Asia is completed, Jules Verne's fancy of a circuit of the world in eighty days may come to seem very slow and old-fashioned travelling. Whatever may be the truth about the condition of the Pacific port of the Canadian road in winter, it is evident that in summer it is likely to take a very large share of the traffic between Europe and the East.
