

Captain Says Andrea Doria Was Going Near Top Speed

NEW YORK (AP)—The master of the ill-fated Andrea Doria testified Thursday his ship was moving at nearly top speed before it collided with the Stockholm off Nantucket last July 25.

Capt. Piero Calamai said: "There were no ships around us. We were not in crowded waters. That's why I was able to proceed regularly."

The captain, appearing tired and worn, spent his ninth day on he witness stand in the inquiry preliminary to trial of more than \$40,000,000 in claims growing out of the collision and sinking of the Andrea Doria. Fifty persons lost their lives.

Calamai had been undergoing minute cross-examination by a battery of lawyers. The procedure brought a protest from Eugene Underwood, chief counsel for the Italian line, that the captain was being subjected to "trial by ordeal."

Underwood said Calamai was being asked needless, senseless and repetitious questions that contributed nothing to the body of facts being sought in advance of trial.

When he did spot the approaching Stockholm by radar, he also had said, he was sure their relative position and direction would permit safe passage.

Each side blames the other for making a wrong turn at the last moment, causing the collision. Each has said, too, that its turn was made to give the other more room.

Calamai admitted he had heard the area around Nantucket described as something like "the Times Square of the Atlantic" but said he believed eastbound ships generally moved farther south of Nantucket than westbound ships.

He had said earlier that he relied on a radar when moving through fog—had he not he would have cut speed to 12 or 14 knots.

Mr. MacNaught Describes To Club Impressions Of Japan

J. Watson MacNaught, Parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, was guest speaker last evening at the regular meeting of the Summerside Y's Men's Club, held in the "Y" Centre.

After being introduced to the club by George Key, Jr., who chaired the meeting, Mr. MacNaught gave those present an interesting account of a trip to Japan made in connection with a conference between Canada, the United States and Japan regarding control of fisheries in the North Pacific.

His talk centered around his personal impressions of the cities of Tokyo, and Kyoto, in which he spent twelve days. He found Tokyo to be a huge, sprawling city, covering an area approximately two-thirds of the total area of P.E.I.

very heavily populated, with congested traffic, a great deal of freight being transported by bicycle and hand drawn vehicles.

In comparison to Canada, he said, where there is an average of fourteen pounds of fish consumed per person each year, and P.E.I. where the average is eight to nine pounds per person, the Japanese eat an average of ninety pounds per person per year.

Of great interest to the market, where some four million pounds of fish are handled every morning, with remarkable efficiency and cleanliness.

He told of the confusion that sometimes develops with non-English speaking taxi drivers, and tourists, due to the lack of street names in Japanese cities.

He mentioned the Japanese people's great interest in photography, with cameras in evidence everywhere. He said that the Japanese are great imitators, having based their main religion, their alphabet, their laws, constitution, army and navy, upon those of other countries.

At the conclusion of his talk he was thanked on behalf of the members by Art Holland.
