The government picked Andre Dubois, a career administrator who was born of French parents in Bone, Algeria. In 16 months as Paris police chief he made a name for himself by silencing noisy auto horns and barring trucks from the capital's narrow streets in busy afternoon hours.

Under the present treaty between France and Morocco, Dubois will not only represent French interests as ambassador to the sultan but handle all foreign affairs.

Ben Youssef, exiled for his nationalism but brought back under national pressure, wants more power for Moroccans. The French government is willing, but how much freedom Morocco will get depends on negotiations.
