### P.E.I. Civil Servants Planning Job Evaluation Resolution

Consideration will be given to a resolution asking the government to carry out a job evaluation and classification program for the province's civil servants, at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Public Servants Association, to be held next Monday evening at the Community Centre in Charlottetown.

Association president J. Vincent MacIntyre said yesterday that the resolution is one of "six or seven" drawn up by the directors of the association for consideration at the meeting.

Another resolution will ask the members to consider an increase in association dues, to provide facilities for administration and research for the organization.

Hon. L.G. Dewar, minister of education, announced yesterday that the province will get a further \$15,400 in physical fitness and a material sports grants from the federal government, to bring the total grant for this year up to \$76,267.

Dr. Dewar said that federal health minister Waldo Bestwick has confirmed that the province will get \$69,867 this year as its share of a \$5,000,000 federal grant to the provinces for promotion of physical fitness, and a further \$15,400 to provide assistance in the planning and organizing of a physical fitness program this year.

According to Dr. Dewar, the federal government has made \$250,000 available as a non-matching grant to the provinces for this one year. Each province gets a straight \$15,000 plus a per capita share.

When division of this year's federal grant was announced about a month ago, each province got a straight \$50,000 plus a per capita grant. Prince Edward Island's per capita grant was \$10,667 bringing the total grant to \$60,667.

### Lot 16 Hall Slate Named

CENTRAL LOT 16 — The annual meeting of the Lot 16 Community Hall was held last week.

It was decided to purchase a new linoleum for the stage and have a heavy electrical circuit and additional outlets installed.

The new directors are Jack Yeo, Mrs. Ralph Monkley, W.P. Miller and Keith Barrett, all re-elected.

The officers for the coming year are president, Edward Clark, (re-elected); vice-president, Jack Yeo; secretary, Mrs. Clarence McFadden (re-elected); treasurer, Wilfred Lyle (re-elected).

Dr. Dewar said the two are John E. Ready, Charlottetown, and Charles Baillem, Summerside.

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### 'North Gaspé' Resumes Run

The second boat of the 1962 shipping season arrived in port early last evening. The ship is the North Gaspé which is engaged in service between Picton, Charlottetown, Souris and the Magdalen Islands.

The season was opened Sunday, three weeks earlier than in 1961, with the arrival of the Imperial Oil tanker, Imperial Halifax.

### 14 Fishermen Are Qualified

Fourteen more Prince Edward Island fishermen have qualified for the temporary master's certificate as a result of a two-week course for those engaged in deep-sea tourist excursions.

This brings to 52 the number of men who have passed the course since it was inaugurated last year by the Travel Bureau, it was announced Tuesday by Director George V. Fraser.

All sections of the province were represented among those who took the examinations, just concluded by Captain I. McDiarmid of the department of transport, Ottawa, who spent the past week in Charlottetown.

Today, Captain A. G. Stanley of the Steamship Inspection Services, department of transport, Halifax, will commence inspection of the boats to be used for tourist fishing this year. He will be here until the weekend and will visit various sections of the province.

Capt. Stanley will also be present at a general meeting of the Deep-sea Fishermen's Association in the film theatre of the Federal Building at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon to explain the inspection regulations, Mr. Fraser said.

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says cold, dry air will give mostly clear weather in the Maritimes and there should be enough sunshine to bring temperatures up to the high 40s. A disturbance approaching from the Great Lakes is expected to bring increasing cloudiness to the southern regions today followed by rain but the northern regions may miss its effect.

Regional forecasts: Halifax and vicinity: South Shore, Annapolis Valley: Clear becoming cloudy about midday; intermittent rain by evening; not much change in temperature; light winds becoming east 15 in the evening. Low-high at Halifax 25 and 50, Yarmouth 28 and 45, Kentville 25 and 48.

Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Clear, becoming cloudy by evening; cold; northwest winds 15, becoming east 15 by evening. Low-high at New Glasgow and Goshen 25 and 47, Sydney 25 and 45, Charlottetown 22 and 47.

## Island PCs Expected To Renominate MPs

While Prince Edward's Liberal candidates got their election campaign off the ground here Monday night, and the New Democrats are slated to go into high gear after a party meeting Thursday, Progressive Conservative candidates began arriving on the Island from Ottawa to get their campaigns organized.

Mrs. Margaret Macdonald is now in the province and took part in a meeting at Montague sponsored by the Young Progressive Conservatives last night. Heath Macquarrie is due in the city this evening, and Hon. Angus MacLean will arrive Thursday. Dr. Orville Phillips

was due on the Island yesterday afternoon.

Yesterday and today, Mr. MacLean is attending a meeting of the Canadian Fisheries Council in Quebec City.

FIRST BUSINESS  
First order of business for the leading PC candidates will be to renominate for the election.

Nominating conventions are scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. On Thursday, Queens County PCs will meet at the Community Centre to name two candidates, who

are virtually certain to be Mr. MacLean and Mr. Macquarrie. Friday night, Kings County PCs meet at Georgetown where Mrs. Macdonald is also a virtually certain candidate, and Saturday night Prince County PCs meet at Civic Auditorium, where Dr. Phillips is likewise the almost-certain choice of delegates.

Early speculation that Dr. Phillips would not renominate was ended some weeks ago by the doctor, himself, who publicly stated he would be a candidate.

TO MOVE SWIFTLY  
Following renomination at these conventions, the Progressive Conservatives are expected to move swiftly into the campaign next week.

The Liberals began their campaign last night with a television broadcast involving the Earl of Galloway, the Earl of Argyll and the Earl of Sutherland, and Earl MacLeod, president of the Fifth District Liberal Association.

Carl Hamilton, National New Democratic Party secretary, will preside over a meeting of the New Dems Thursday night at the Charlottetown Hotel, where the party's financial campaign and election strategy will be ironed out.

As election campaigning begins in earnest, here is a breakdown of how the parties fared in the last election of March 1958, and the Kings County by-election of 1961.

PRINCE COUNTY: Phillips (PC) 10,088; MacNaught (L) 6,490; Gallant (CCF) 211. Majority for Phillips 3,387.

QUEENS COUNTY: MacLean (PC) 13,701; Campbell (L) 7,334; Macquarrie (PC) 13,289; Reid (L) 7,609. Majority for MacLean 6,367; for Macquarrie 5,660.

KINGS COUNTY: Macdonald (PC) 4,923; Kichham (L) 3,774. Majority for Macdonald 1,149. BYELECTION: Macdonald (PC) 4,476; Kichham (L) 4,309. Majority for Macdonald 167.

The 1958 election saw a record 86 per cent vote on the Island with 45,744 of 53,108 eligible voters turning out.

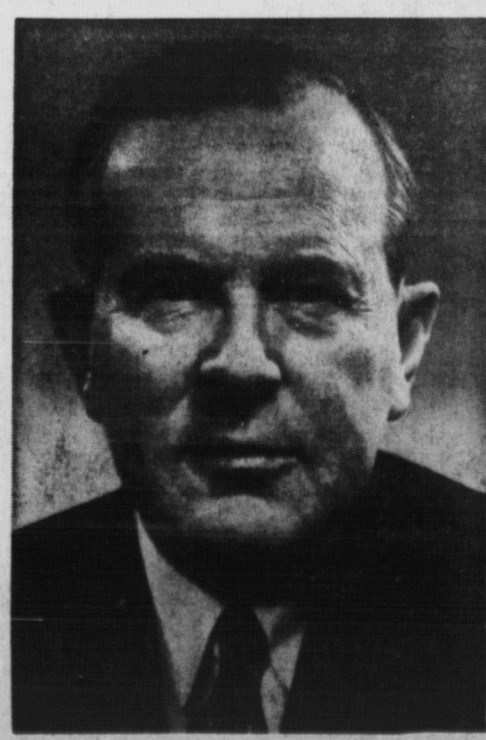
