The Canadian Pacific Railway Contract.

Sir Richard Defeated in his own Meeting.

Sir Charles Triumphant at London, Ont.

Goldwin Smith's Opinion.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.

Sir Richard Cartwright held a meeting at Kingston on Monday night. The meeting was a large one.

Mr. Kirkpatrick was present. Mr. Sullivan, (Conservative,) moved a resolution endorsing the terms of the Syndicate Contract.

Mr. McIntyre seconded the resolution. At the conclusion of the speech, he asked the meeting if it approved of the resolution a ringing cheer was the response. A vast majority stood in favor of the terms. An amendment was moved by Mr. Gunn. The chairman, a Grit, put the amendment refusing to put the original resolution.

Cartwright is beaten on his own ground, the people refusing to listen to a speech from him.

Mr. Blake still refuses to allow Sir Charles Tupper to speak at his meeting. Sir Charles meets with an enthusiastic reception wherever he goes. An immense meeting was addressed by Tupper last night at London, Ont. This meeting, to a man, endorsed the present agreement.

Goldwin Smith says he went to an expert to ascertain if the Pacific Railway bargain was a good one. After comparing the cost of American and other roads, he considers the bargain a good one for the country. Mr. Smith condemns the premature violence of the Toronto *Globe* and the pell-mell onslaught by the Opposition against the agreement. He says the opportunity has been lost by them, and considers that none but productive portions should be built.

The Montreal local Board of Trade is considering the terms. The members feel they would not be warranted in taking action to embarrass the Government.

The action of a small section of the local Grit party in bringing Mr. Blake to Montreal has met with rebuff from some prominent members of the Liberal party who decline to sign the requisition.

The *Globe* contains a singular account of the meeting in Charlottetown, placing the number present at 1,000.

The agitation in favor of building the road by taxing the older Provinces is condemned by Island members.

The challenge to Island politicians one thousand miles away to appear on the platform was a happy thought.

The last resolution is looked upon as absurd.

Mr. Mackenzie offered more money and double the quantity of land.

His Act gave the Company permission to select land anywhere in the North West.

The *Globe* says the subsidy is not too much.

No meeting held in Ontario and addressed by the Opposition leaders was called by the people. The political engines were worked from Ottawa. The Grit battle cry is placarded "God Save Canada." He appears to be trying it. The first meeting was turned against the Grits.
