- Cream of Asparagus Soup
- Smoked Beef Tongue
- Mustard Sauce
- Potatoes Cooked with Peas
- Stuffed Beet Salad
- Old-Fashioned Bread Pudding
- Hot or Iced Coffee or Tea Milk

Stuffed Beet Salad: coop out the centers from 6 good-sized cooked beets to form cups. Stuff with cucumber-bee-cream cheese filling.

Arrange individually in nests of lettuce leaves. Garnish with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing.

Cucumber-Cream Cheese Filling: Blend 1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, 1 1/2 c. grated firm portion cucumber, 1/2 tsp. horseradish, 1/2 tsp. onion juice or 1/4 tsp. celery

Child psychologists are always urging parents to make work seem like play — to make children learn

THE UNEPEXPECTED

For instance, a storage cabinet that looks like a storage cabinet and is set along the wall where a storage cabinet belongs, doesn't offer much by way of excitement. It is just a grim, unimaginative reminder of tasks to be done.

But a large storage drawer that pulls out from under the bunk bed is the sort of exciting, secret hiding place for valued possessions that appeals to a child's imagination.

HOUSEHOLD HINT

To make a polish that cleans and feeds wood, doesn't leave a gummy film or collect dust, mix equal parts of fresh lemon juice, denatured alcohol, olive oil and gum turpentine. Do not use substitutes. 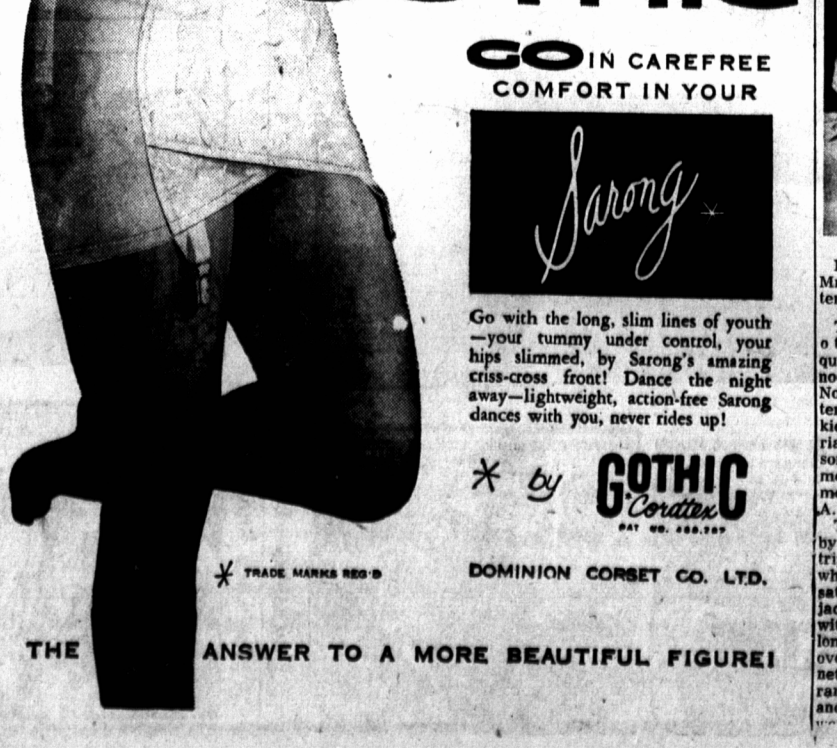

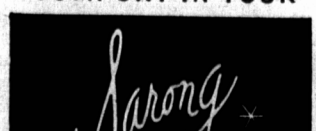
