MONDAY, Nov. 24.—William Lamb born in 1778, became M. P. for Westminster (England) 1812, and Secretary for Ireland 1827, succeeded his father as Viscount Melbourne, 1828, and died 24th Nov. 1848. On the retirement of Earl Grey 9th July 1834, Viscount Melbourne became first Minister of the Crown. Sir Robert Peel succeeded, but was forced to resign 1835, and Lord Melbourne returned to office. The administration of Lord Melbourne finally Aug. 30, 1841, when Sir Robert Peel again came into power.

Ordinary Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions; Algebra, subjects included in Colenso to and of Simple Equations of one unknown quantity; Euclid, Books 1 and II.

In English:—Orthography, Writing from Dictation, Parsing and Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography.

The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years. Candidates must send in their names to the undersigned on or before 1st May, 1885, when they will be duly informed of day and place of examination.
