U.S. Prestige May Suffer Damage By White Affair

LONDON, (Reuters) — British and continental newspapers shook their heads sorrowfully Wednesday over the Harry Dexter White affair and hoped it would soon be over.

Right, centre and leftist newspapers expressed belief that United States prestige abroad may prove the chief victim of the row. There was hardly a good word for Attorney-General Herbert Brownell who touched off the controversy with his charge that Truman promoted White in the face of FBI reports that White was a Communist spy.

From Vienna came one of the most forthright criticisms of Brownell's bias at Harry Truman. The Socialist newspaper Arbeiter Zeitung said the "Brownell bomb" was a deliberate electioneering manoeuvre which probably will explode in the Republican party's face.
