

Grand Jury retired, and in the course of the day returned four bills against different persons for larceny.

On Wednesday, the Grand Jury found a true bill against Margaret Collings, of Charlottetown, for administering poison with intent to kill her mother Catherine McEachern.

On the same day, Isaiah Enman, for breaking into Acorn's Mill, Lot 49, and stealing three cow-hides therefrom, was tried and found guilty, but recommended to mercy.

Henry Vaughan, Private in the Rifle Brigade, was tried for stealing a side of sole leather from the warehouse of Mr. D. Wilson.

The Trial of John Mackenzie, of New London, came on on Thursday. The indictment charges the traverser with forging a receipt for £13 17s. with intent to defraud John C. Sims, Esq., and other counts charge him with altering the same, uttering it, knowing it to be forged or altered, &c.

On Wednesday last, J. A. Street, Esq., of Miramichi, was admitted a Barrister of the Supreme Court of this Island.

RIOTS IN PRINCE COUNTY.—Thirty-three of the parties against whom Bills of Indictment were found during the late Session of the Supreme Court at St. Eleanor's, have, we understand, surrendered to the High Sheriff of the County.

Yesterday being the anniversary of Her Majesty's coronation, a Royal salute was fired from the garrison at 12 o'clock. Thursday the 20th, was the seventh anniversary of Her Majesty's accession to the throne, (not the coronation, as erroneously stated in our last) on which occasion a salute was also fired.

The Queen vs. Donald M. Donald, Angus' son, for an Assault on Joseph Campbell—Defendant, fined 5s. and costs, and in default of payment in six weeks, to be imprisoned for a period of six weeks.

The Queen vs. Joseph Campbell, for an Assault on Angus M. Donald, case dismissed, each party paying their own costs.

The Queen vs. John M. Eachern, for an Assault on Angus M. Donald, case dismissed.

The Queen vs. John Sigsworth, for an Assault on Mary Evans, both of Georgetown Royalty—Defendant, fined 10s. and Costs, and in default of payment in six weeks, to be imprisoned six weeks.

SHIP NEWS.

Capt Richards, of the Brig John Hawkes, saw on the 16th May, at 6 p.m., a ship, in lat. 49 north, lon 37 20 west, 5 miles on the larboard bow, bearing W. S. W., with foremast, fore-top-mast, bowsprit and jib-boom standing, supposed to be water-tight, as she was ranging about with the sea, and which appeared to be washing over her. At half-past 6, passed under her lee, but the wind blowing very strong from the S. W. with a heavy sea on, could not fetch within two miles of her. Saw no signal, nor any person on board—she appeared to be about 7 or 800 tons burthen.—The foremast painted white.

The Brig Constant of Sunderland, Contwoods, Master, bound to Three Rivers, in Ballast to load Timber, went ashore on Boughton reef on the night of the 19th ult. She has been condemned and ordered for sale for the benefit of all concerned.

The Bark Jean Cranberry, from Boston, bound for St. John, N. B. went ashore near Cranberry head on the 20th inst., and will be a total wreck.—Crew and materials saved.

The brig Lady Huntley, Daley, of this port, arrived at Halifax on the 18th inst. from Cienfuegos. Arrived at Quebec, June 14th, the Bark Florence, Brummage, from Charlottetown, with 40 passengers. [The Florence was from Plymouth, and put in here to undergo repairs.]

LAUNCHED.

On the 2d inst. from the Ship Yard of Mr. Weatherbe, at Seven Mile Bay, a schooner of 143 tons (G. M.), called the Mary. This vessel was built expressly for the Newfoundland market, and we are told has been faithfully finished.

On Saturday, the 6th April, at Dunbar, aged 92 years, Mrs. J. Reaburn. Mrs. R. was a most rigid Cameronian, and retained in her possession the flag of the Covenant, which was borne by her grandfather at the Battle of Bothwell Brig. Although somewhat tattered, still all the emblems and inscriptions are perfectly legible. The old lady prized it above rubies, and has transmitted it as an heirloom to her family.

At Windsor, on the 14th April, in her 34th year, Mrs. Sophia Elizabeth Kellner, relict of Mr. C. Kellner. Mrs. K. was lineally descended from Martin Luther, the great champion in the cause of Protestantism in Germany, from which circumstance, during the lifetime of her late Majesty Queen Charlotte, she was honored with particular notice and regard.

On the 13th May, at Swillington Hall, near Leeds, aged 85, Sir John Lowther, Bart., brother to the late and uncle to the present Earl of Lonsdale. Also on Sunday night, as preparations were making for the interment of her husband, Lady Lowther.
