Mr. J. A. Woodburn, of St. John, N. B., spent a few days in the early part of the week in Summerside, soliciting orders for a portable fire engine called L'Extincteur. He had one of the smallest size with him as a specimen. It holds about twelve pints of water, and appears more like a toy than a serviceable fire engine. At the request of some of the townspeople Mr. Woodburn consented on Monday evening to make a trial of the effectiveness of this engine. A pile, composed of three large tar barrels and a lot of shavings, was erected on the engine house square. This was set on fire and allowed to burn for some time. The tar barrels burned very fiercely, and the flames could not have been less than ten feet high. To attempt to extinguish so considerable a fire with the liquid contained in an engine not much larger than a good sized coffee pot seemed an utter absurdity. Mr. Woodburn, however, set to work and he had not directed the thin jet upon the fire for two minutes before the whole was a black mass. The effect was almost magical. From what we saw we are thoroughly convinced that the L'Extincteur is a most efficient fire extinguisher. There is no deception about it. It can do all that those interested in selling it declare it capable of doing. Every owner of property, particularly in places like this where water is scarce and the means of extinguishing fires scanty, should procure one of these portable engines with as little delay as possible.

THE CALEDONIAN CLUB.
