The crop prospects were never better on the upper St. John.

SIX cases of drunkenness were disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon.

Forty five head of cattle, belonging to one farmer in Pictou Co., N. S., have died this season of cattle disease.

The S. Hubenacade Canal, was offered at auction, at Halifax, on Tuesday, but no one seemed disposed to bid.

Beds of iron ore, which it is thought may be profitably mined, have been recently discovered in Buctouche, N. B.

The hay market to-day was unusually large. The stock was generally good and sold at from 35 to 40 cents per hundred.

Forty eight little girls from Miss Rye's London Home arrived at Quebec by the "Peruvian" a few days ago. They are bound for Niagara.

The men arrested in Carleton, N. B., for the murder of James Campbell, were tried on Tuesday and Wednesday, and the jury returned a verdict of "Not guilty."

MR. A. L. BRIDGES exhibited at the EXAMINER office, yesterday, a few samples of oats and wheat in stalk, grown on his father's farm, St. Peter's Road, which are well worthy of notice. The stalks of wheat (Canadian) were nearly six feet long, with heads between six and one-half and seven inches. The oats, which was of the kind known as the Russian white, was over five feet tall, with splendid full heads. Mr. Bridges informs us that the wheat was grown on turnip soil, and the oats on soil in which potatoes were raised last year.

"WHERE do the potato bugs come from?" is the question asked by some of our farmers. This seems a difficult interrogation, as small numbers of the pest have been found in so many different sections of the country at the same time. Among the potato patches visited by the bug are those of Messrs. Daniel Murray and Donald Palmer, of Victoria, and Wm. Muirhead, of Tryon. We are pleased to learn that the bugs, though numerous in some parts, will not effect the potato crop this year, as the veins are too strong to be effected.

THE stallion Almont, sire of Hernando, is producing some of the finest and fastest trotting stock ever shown to the world. Six of his get have already records under 2:19. Of these we might mention Early Rose, a green mare, which came on the turf last year, and reduced her record this year to 2:18. Aldin, whose record was, last year, 2:26, this year came out 2:19, and Fanny Witherspoon, which came out 2:19 last year, and received a 2:19 record last year, trotted a mile heat in 2:15. The most famous of Almont's get, Piedmont, trotted through last season, received a 2:17 record, and was sold for \$30,000. We hope Hernando will show as good stock as his sire.

EGYPTIAN NEWS.

Wolsley's Plan of Attack.

Aboukir to be Bombarded.

[THE EXAMINER'S regular telegraphic despatch did not arrive to-day. Just before going to press THE EXAMINER telegraphed for telegrams and now lays them before its readers.]

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

DUBLIN, Aug. 17.

Mr. Gray was removed to prison yesterday, in a carriage surrounded by buzzards with drawn sabres.

At the banquet yesterday evening to celebrate the presentation of the freedom of the city to Messrs. Parnell and Dillon, there was a large attendance. The toast, "The Queen," was drunk with considerable enthusiasm, intermixed with hisses from numbers of the spectators.

Earl Spencer has ordered the release of fifty suspects who were arrested in the Loughrea district after the murder of Mr. Bourke.

It is reported that Gray who was sentenced to imprisonment yesterday is in delicate health.

PARIS, Aug. 17.

The Gaulois states that Prince Strain Pasha, fourth son of the ex Khedive, Ismail Pasha, has obtained leave from his father to proceed to London to solicit permission from the Duke of Cambridge to serve as a private in the English army in Egypt after the campaign is finished.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 17.

Negotiations are proceeding with the Canal Company for the hiring of the wire from Suez to Port Said. If accomplished it will complete the telegraphic communication between Suez and England.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

A despatch from Alexandria states that General Wolsley has decided that the British advance shall be made from Aboukir. The troops will embark on Saturday, and land and attack the Aboukir forts on Sunday. The Khedive to-day visited Wolsley, on board the despatch boat Salamis, and remained an hour.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 17.

Reports continue to assert that a combined land and sea attack on the forts at Aboukir is imminent. According to the last accounts they are to be made on Sunday morning.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 16.

The water supply here is sufficient to last several hours. A party of Arabs destroyed the pump at Ramleh station, last night.

An encounter between a British mounted patrol and a party of 500 Bedouins occurred early this morning near Ramleh. Five of the latter were killed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 16.

It is stated in Turkish circles, that the hesitation to issue a proclamation against Arabi Pasha is owing to the fact that a telegram was received from him a few days ago, expressing his readiness to submit to the authority of the Caliph, but stating that he could not leave his soldiers without a head until the arrival of Turkish troops in Egypt, when he would instantly hand over his command to the Turkish general. The convention is still unsettled for the same reason.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 16.

Col. Gerard, who rode out this morning in a reconnaissance, succeeded in making a sketch of the enemy's position.

Major Gordon, chief of police, has handed over his office to the native authorities. European residents consider this proceeding unwise.

The weather is becoming cooler. The troopship "Thalis" has arrived. The water works service stopped for the first time on Tuesday, but will be re-supplied for a short time on Wednesday. Tuesday being the last day of the heiran, the Khedive appeared in good spirits and referred to passing events in a light happy manner. General Aclay, Admiral Seymour and many other British officers visited the Khedive. The commissariat is working smoothly.

The French Consul has undertaken to guarantee the character of the correspondent of the Paris newspaper L'Evening, who was arrested at the outposts, and he will be released with a severe warning to be careful of his future conduct.

Apprehensions regarding the safety of the Suez Canal having been removed, business in the insurance of ships against war risks has ceased.

Lot 11 Notes.

The potato bug has made its appearance here and various means are resorted to for its extermination. One old lady guarantees their speedy exit by the use of ashes thrown in their faces.

On Sunday last Sacrament was dispensed here in the English Church. The services were conducted by the Rev. T. B. Reagh who though only a short time here has won hosts of friends by his able and Christian like discourse.

Quite a number of buildings have been erected here during the past summer. Among the best being the barn of Thomas Miltigan, Esq., Agent.

A very serious accident happened to Mr. James Moran, senr., of Foxly River. While driving last week the horse ran away and, in jumping over a fence near his residence, Mr. Moran was thrown from the wagon a distance of twenty feet, dislocating his ankle and causing several other internal injuries. He was, at latest accounts, improving rapidly.

Complaints are made of the rowdy character of some persons congregating near Poplar Grove, and the attention of law officers is directed to the matter.
