THIS IS THE DAY the big one starts. This morning more than 100 golfers will be teeing off at Belvedere Golf Club in the quest for the Prince Edward Island open title. The best amateurs and professionals will be bidding for the title won last year by Belvedere professional Cecil (Bobby) Dowling.

The big field will start play this morning and a second 18 holes will be played Sunday morning with golfers leaving the tee about every five minutes. Sunday afternoon the crown will be on the line when all the visiting pros and the 12 top amateurs grapple for the marbles. The defending amateur champ is Charlottetown's Harry Simmons, who last year just missed winning the whole show.

Golf fans will remember last year's open and the way Dowling came through. Bobby had a bad first day shooting a poor 78. But Sunday he caught fire and blazed around the links with a 69 in the morning-best of the tournament - and carded a 72 in the afternoon to tie Bathurst's Pete Kelly for top spot.

In as dramatic a playoff as had been seen here in some years Bobby won the title on the second sudden-death hole sinking a chip shot from more than 40 feet away. It was a shot that left them talking for days afterwards.

IT IS PLAYOFF TIME in just about every organized softball and baseball league around the Island. The City League softballers have been at it for some time. Kings County Baseball League started last week as did the Kings-Queens baseball club. This week the Little Leaguers and bantams got at it and today the Junior Abbies take the first step in the playoffs when they meet a combined team from Morell-Peakes. In fact there doesn't seem to be much else except playoffs going on.

Jack Ready's Charlottetown Little Leaguers won the P.E.I. crown the hard way. The youngsters lost the opening game at Memorial Field on Wednesday and were faced with the task of sweeping a pair at Summerside's Queen Elizabeth Park yesterday if they were to stay alive. It is a tribute to their spirit they could come off the floor to beat the Summerside squad twice and grab the provincial crown.

That was the end of the road this year for Little League, but the bantams are just getting started. The Summerside squad travelled to Charlottetown Wednesday beat the home team and won the bantam mantle by splitting the Abbies Thursday.

Summerside now goes against the Kings County winner for the blue chips and the winner of this series wins the right to compete in the Maritime tournament at Truro Aug. 28-29.

THE CITY LEAGUE softball playoffs have been running into some difficulties with the setting sun which is going down earlier and earlier as the late summer season wears on. Several games have been called off on account of darkness and this week we saw the Rollaway-Aces - BIS Shamrocks contest twice postponed. League officials went into a huddle following the abbreviated game Thursday night and decided to play this afternoon along with the fifth game of the series should the Shamrocks be able to blank the Aces 9-0 and go on to win.

Baseball on this afternoon is the sixth game of the Juniors-Lions series. This is a must victory. The Juniors have lost all the games they can afford to lose. One more defeat and they will be spending the rest of the season as spectators.

KINGS COUNTY FANS are assured of plenty of excitement over the weekend with games scheduled between Mount Stewart Legionaires and Peakes Bombers and St. Peter's Rovers and Georgetown. Last week the Legion nine shaded the Bombers in a thriller at the Legion's camp 5-4. Some 1,500 fans sat in on that one and it is likely that local pride around Peakes will see to it that the crowd out their Sunday will surpass that.

The Bombers, of course, are facing elimination for one more loss and they are out. Their faithful following around the area will be out to root them home over the Legion - a time that has been nearly unbeatable this year not only in Kings County but in Queens as well.

Meanwhile Georgetown and St. Peter's will be completing one game and starting another. Last week their contest was called leading by two runs. The second game of the series will end after 10 innings because of a downpour of rain. Georgetown was played immediately following completion of the postponed game.

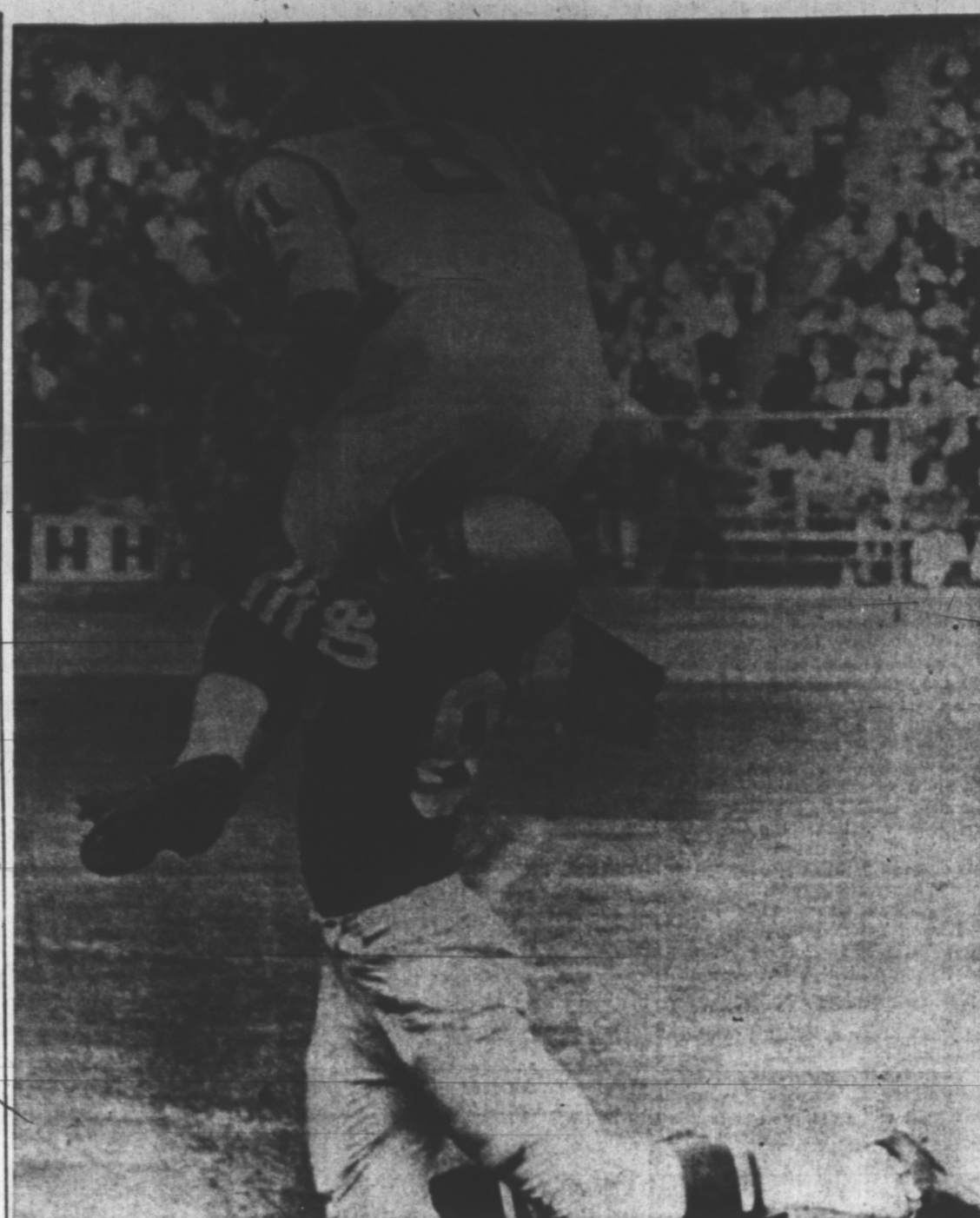

Von Clay TKO's Sonny Ray In 5th

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Young Von Clay completed his rapid rise to the top ranks of the light-heavyweights Friday night with a decisive technical knockout of fourth-ranked Sonny Ray in 56 seconds of the fifth round. Clay, a 29-year-old Philadelphiaan with only 11 pro fights under his belt, sent Ray down for a count of eight in the fourth round and left uppercut in the next round he was rocking Ray with left and right jabs and hooks when referee Zack Clayton

stopped the televised bout. The fight was a scheduled 10-rounder. In the fourth round Clay abandoned his strategy of throwing a pair of left jabs and then a right hook and started pushing Ray around with left and right hooks. Sonny's eyes started bleeding badly and a left uppercut from Clay knocked him down for a count of eight. The round ended a few seconds later. The Associated Press card showed 18-15 for Clay.

Island Open Golf Ch'ships Will Get Underway Today

The Prince Edward Island Open—one of the Maritime's largest golf tournaments—get underway at the Belvedere course this morning with a field of more than 175 participating. Amateur and professionals representing 22 golf clubs—including nearly every club in the Maritimes—will tee off at an early hour in the first 18 holes of the medal play competition. The second 18-hole round will be played Sunday morning and in the afternoon the professionals and the 12 leading amateurs will battle it out for the crown.

Charlottetown golfers are the defending open and amateur champs. In 1958 Cecil (Bobby) Dowling defeated Pete Kelly of Bathurst in a dramatic playoff to win the pro and open titles, while young Harry Simmons finished one stroke back of Dowling and Kelly to take the amateur championship.

All maritime professionals are expected to be entered in the 54-hole tourney. They will be given a hot run for the blue chips by the seaside provinces' leading amateurs.

The Belvedere Club, as usual will have an exceedingly strong entry list headed by such dependables as the defending champ Simmons, Art MacKenzie, Don V. MacDonald, Bill (Pud) Beer, Wendall Gillis, Merlin MacKenzie, Bobby Dowling and a host of others.

Yesterday in a tuneup for the big tournament Bobby Dowling, a brother of the Belvedere pro and well known Moncton amateur Mousie Dowling, fired a three-under par score of 69 and in addition scored the first hole-in-one of his career. Actually there will be six championships decided over the two-day meet. They include, the amateur, professional, open, junior, senior and team.

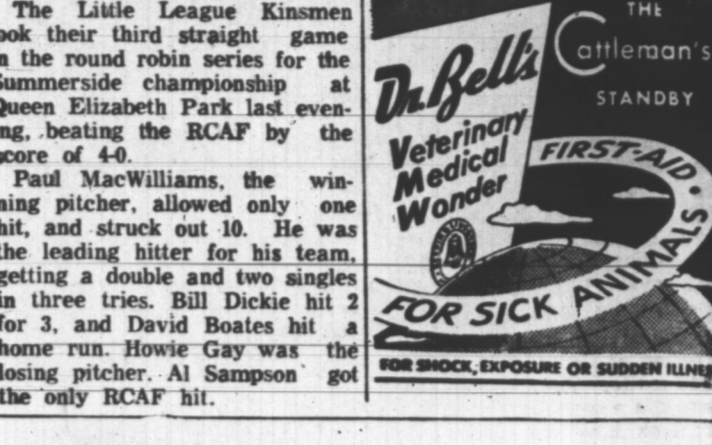

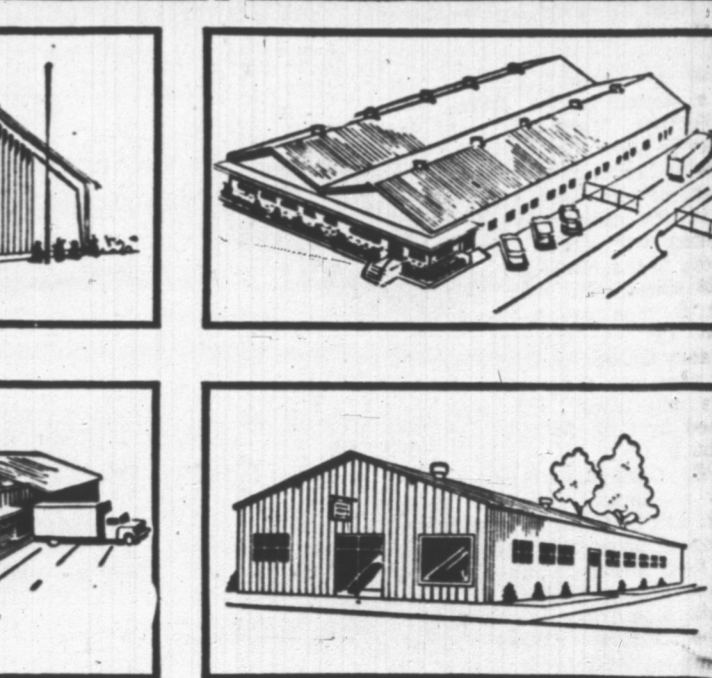


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
