

we could do if we were part and parcel of the British islands; but somehow or other, we are not a sociable race, given to pleasure and to frolics,—for while the St. Johnites would be getting up balls, dinner parties and regattas, we would be thinking about going to prayer meetings, and coming away not much better Christians than when we went. We suggested, at the very moment when the people of Charlottetown were preparing their candles for the illumination, that we should adopt some other additional means of giving expression to the public feeling. A County Meeting could have been convened and an address of congratulation to the Queen agreed upon, without any expense. We have a noble harbor, and could easily have got up a regatta—(how long is it since we have had one?)—we have beauty and fashion enough to fill any respectable ball-room in the place; and surely there is no great want of choice spirits, who, if brought together, would constitute a very good dinner party. But nobody will take the initiative in any of these things; and, indeed, if anybody did, everybody else would think him forward and officious; and thus, owing to our petty rivalries and jealousies, we are eternally making ourselves and each other miserable, and don't seem like a community of civilized beings. It is more in sorrow than in anger we thus bear testimony to the want of a wholesome public opinion in Charlottetown. All small towns are, perhaps, more or less, circumstanced in this respect as we are. When we grow older it is to be hoped that we shall become wiser and better, at least more sociable and less distrustful of each other.

In order to make room for a continuation of the highly interesting details respecting the Siege of Sebastopol, as well as for a number of new advertisements, we are compelled to omit some editorial articles prepared for this issue.

With respect to the leader in the last *Islander*, headed "More administrative bungling," we have only room to say that it is a mass of the most palpable falsehoods from beginning to end. We may take occasion, in a future Number, to place before our readers a plain unvarnished statement of the facts connected with the seizure of the American schr. *Drogont*.

By the Mail Packet on Friday last, we learned that a telegraphic despatch had been received at St. John, N. B., announcing the arrival at New York of one of the European steamers, bringing the intelligence that an engagement had really taken place at Eupatoria, in which the Russians had been utterly routed by the Allied cavalry; and that the Anglo-French fleets had sailed from Sebastopol, with secret orders; but their destination was generally supposed to be Odessa. We trust that the next English mail will furnish intelligence of the successful bombardment of that place—an event that we have long since expected.

COLONIAL NEWS.

NEWS FROM THE BAHAMAS.

Our files of Nassau (N. P.) papers are dated to the 10th of September, and contain some interesting items. The *Bahama Herald* of the 19th ult., says:—By the arrival, on Sunday morning, of the Brig *Victoria*, from Rum Key, we learn that the heavy rains continued, and that the salt prospects this year are entirely ruined. About 40,000 or 50,000 bushels remained on hand. Athol Island, situated at the east end of Hog Island, has been, we are informed, purchased by the English Government for \$800. It is in contemplation to build an hospital there. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor left Nassau on the 19th inst., on an excursion to Charlotteville.

CAPTAIN OF THE SCHOONER LADY BANNERMAN.—The captain of the Schooner *Star*, which arrived on Monday morning, informs us that the Schooner *Lady Bannerman*, recently built at Abaco, while lying at anchor near Yucatan, on the Mucquitto shore, was boarded by two boats and taken into Yucatan as a prize, and the captain and crew made prisoners. The *L. B.* had on board some logs of mahogany, which it was believed had been taken from the shore. The captured vessel was owned by Messrs. Roberts and Saunders, of Abaco. The Schooner *Galvanic* was chased by a war steamer on the same coast, but managed to escape from her. We are told that the *G.*'s mast is sprung in two places, occasioned by a press of sail in running from the steamer.—*Bahama Herald*, Sept. 19.

MARRIAGE OF MISS BANNERMAN.

The marriage of Captain Syngé, Royal Engineers, F.R.G.S., to Miss Bannerman, the amiable and accomplished niece of our highly-esteemed Governor, was celebrated this morning in Christ Church, the Reverend Archdeacon Trew performing the ceremony. The bride was elegantly attired, and looked particularly interesting. On arriving at the Church, flowers were strewn over the aisle, as she advanced to the altar by the girls of the class taught by her in the Saint Agnes' Sunday School, and a merry peal of bells—temporarily placed in the belfry—was rung. On leaving the Church the same joyous sound accompanied the happy pair until they reached Government House, where His Excellency Sir Alexander and Lady Bannerman had invited a select number of friends to a very recherche entertainment. The children of the Schools belonging to the Woodcock Foundation, (Bain's Town), for whose welfare Captain Syngé has always evinced a devoted interest, and the Sunday Schools of St. Agnes and St. Matthew, with their teachers, were present during the marriage ceremony, and sang several appropriate psalms. They afterwards repaired in procession to Government Hill, bearing flags and banners with appropriate mottoes and devices, and were munificently entertained by His Excellency and Lady Bannerman. The grounds of Government House were very tastefully decorated. The tents, formed of flags and gaily decorated with wreaths of flowers and evergreens, imparted quite a lively aspect to the scene. The tri-colour of France and crescent of Turkey were conspicuous among numerous other flags. The steeple of Christ Church was decorated with flags, and the bells within, before alluded to, rang merrily every hour from 6 o'clock, a. m., till the ceremony was over. We cordially wish the Bride and Bridegroom health, long life and happiness.

JAMAICA.

Sir Henry Barkly, Governor of Jamaica, was about to apply for leave of absence from his Government for a few months, and would take his departure for England immediately after the close of the Session of the Legislature. "Many persons think," the *Watchman* says, "that should he go at the period mentioned, he will not return to Jamaica, seeing that his administration is daily becoming so very unpopular."

NEWFOUNDLAND.

St. John's, N. F., OCTOBER 4.—MURDER.—On Tuesday night last, between eleven and twelve o'clock, a scuffle took place in Water Street, near Messrs. Baine, Johnston & Co.'s premises, in the course of which a fine young lad named Denis Summers, aged about 20, son of the late Mr. P. Summers of this place, was stabbed with a knife in the heart and almost immediately expired. The perpetrator of the awful deed is not yet known. Two or three persons have been taken up on suspicion; but the Coroner and Jury, who were engaged all last night, without having elicited any information tending to close the inquiry. The inquest will be resumed to-day.—*Newfoundlander*.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

ASTONISHING.—We stated in our last that the fourth annual subscription took place at St. Malachi's Church on Sunday last. We learn from the *Freeman* of yesterday that at the several services—morning and evening—over £1,000 were collected. Among the principal subscriptions were George Carvill, Esq., £50; Henry McCullough, Esq., £50; John Doherty, Esq., £40; William Doherty & Co., £30; William Doherty, Esq., £30; A. McTavish, Esq., £25; John McSweeney, £25; &c. &c., and there were several £10 and £7 10s. and £5 subscriptions. Notwithstanding that upwards of £13,000 had been previously subscribed, the people appear to be as zealous and liberal as if they had £13,000 more to put down. Surely here is an example worthy of imitation by all other congregations, having debts hanging over them and complaining of want of funds to carry out improvements. The Catholic Cathedral when finished will be an ornament to the City. The spire will be seen for miles distant; and we hope that Bishop Connolly will not forget to place a clock in the tower; and by all means have a chime of bells that we may have "music in the spheres."—*St. John Morning News*.

CANADA.

TRADE OF QUEBEC.—In 1854, 1,044 vessels—451,443 tons; 1855, 407 vessels—252,107 tons. This shows a great falling off of the foreign trade of the port, in the current year.

There was a brilliant illumination of the City of Montreal, on the night of October 4, in honor of the achievements of the Allies at Sebastopol. More than five columns of the Montreal Herald, no miniature sheet, are occupied with descriptions of the transparencies, giving the idea of a general "lighting up" on a most loyal scale.

NOVA SCOTIA.

SEIZURE.—The Schr. *Blossom*, Capt. Mason, of this port, was seized on Monday last, for a breach of the revenue laws. Information having been forwarded to David McCulloch, Esq., Collector of Excise, that the *Blossom* was illegally landing goods at the Gulf shore, that gentleman, accompanied by Mr. A. G. McKay, seizing officer, proceeded to that place on Monday, and having obtained sufficient assistance, succeeded in getting possession of the vessel and the cargo on board, although they met with some resistance from those on board, assisted by persons living in the neighbourhood. The *Blossom* is an old vessel, of small size, and of but little value. The principal part of the stuff on board is three casks of brandy and a number of barrels of apples and onions.—*Eastern Chronicle*.

The Portsmouth, N. H., carpenters have recently contracted to build nine large ships.

The Barque *Ann Reddin*, owned by Dennis Reddin, Esquire, arrived here on Monday last, after a passage of 25 days from Liverpool, G. B., with a general cargo; she will sail from Charlottetown about the 10th November, for Liverpool, and will return in the spring.
