THE GOVERNMENTS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND ITALY.

The governments of Great Britain and Italy have made it plain that they are not inclined to follow the example of Russia, France and Germany and the great commercial interests of the United States in the east, which the Japanese-Chinese treaty of peace has largely benefited.

THE TREATY OF PEACE.

The treaty of peace has already been ratified by the Emperor of Japan, and will be extremely difficult to make any changes.

THE LONDON TIMES.

The London Times' correspondent at Shanghai telegraphs: "Russia has requested the Chinese government to delay for a few days the ratification of the peace convention entered into by the Chinese and Japanese plenipotentiaries at Shimoneki."

THE PEKIN DISPATCH.

A Peking dispatch to the Times says: It is the opinion of southern Manchuria, as provided for in the treaty of peace, that is chiefly opposed in the Chinese capital.

THE LONDON STANDARD.

A despatch to the London Standard from Berlin says the National Gazette declares that Japan must not be allowed to drive German trade out of China, nor to acquire a permanent military footing in China such as would enable her to shut the door in Germany's face.
